IDAHO BANKERS  
TO TAKE COURSE  
AT UNIVERSITY

Multitude of Farm Problems to Be Considered by the Class Technically, Economically.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow (Special)—Approximately 40 bankers from Idaho and the Northwest, and the bankers' short course at the University of Idaho, January 27 and 28. The course is sponsored by the Idaho Bankers' Association in cooperation with the agricultural committee of the Idaho Bankers' association.

The course, it is expected, will be a complete abandonment of the

old, outmoded methods of

banking.

This course is probably

the first of its nature in the

northwest. Though arranged

for bankers, it will also be of interest to all farmers, who are welcome to participate.

The program includes talks by local agricultural specialists and bankers, several lecture staff members provided, the notable entertainment being given by the bankers' short course students. Dean Fiddlers of the college of agriculture will welcome the bankers, and Dr. Fred D. Johnson, chairman of the bankers' agricultural group, will respond. Thursday evening, January 27, the bankers will hold a meeting at the Moscow hotel with J. S. Hockenberry, president of the First National Bank of Moscow, as toastmaster. J. W. Ladd, manager of the First National Bank of Nampa, Dean Fiddlers, and Dean Ingalls will speak at the podium. Idaho farm bureaus, as well as western feeders, seed, cattle, poultry, livestock, will be considered in both technical and economic light, during the coming eight courses.
