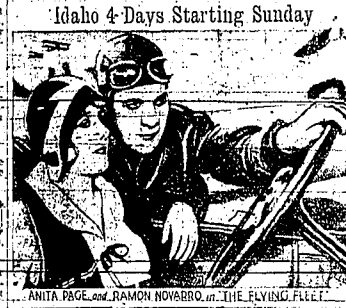

THE RABBIT INDUSTRY

THE production of rabbit meat is becoming a factor of economic importance in this country, according to figures made available recently. Development of the industry past the mere "raising" has been made possible in large part by reason of utilizing meat, and the market for rabbit meat shows a rapid expansion. The distribution points established in practically all of the large cities.

Twin Falls people are participating in this new line of endeavor. The little animals thrive well in this climate, and feeds suitable to their growth are easily produced. The national organization of rabbit breeders includes 4200 members.

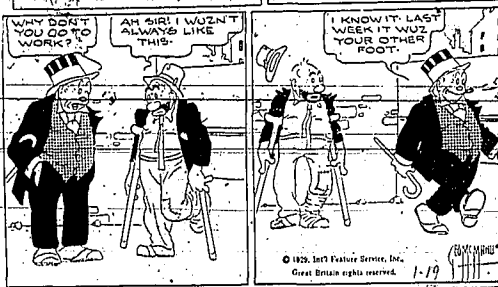

IDAHOANS SHOW KEEN INTEREST IN TAX SUBJECT
More Than 90 Communities Respond by Casting Ballots on Eight Major Questions

BOISE, Jan. 19 (Special) — Results of the statewide vote on tax questions discussed at the first annual taxation conference sponsored by the Idaho State Board of Commerce, December 13 and 14, show Idahoans to be deeply interested in a subject discussed by Robert E. Thomas, secretary of the organization.

More than 100 voters have received and tabulated and returned Mr. Thomas says, more will come in but a count will not be made until the annual meeting of the State Chamber which will be held in Boise, January 17.

More than 90 communities of the state were represented in the vote. Fifteen straggled. 13 chambers of commerce, 13 chambers of agriculture, 13 chambers of industry and 13 chambers of labor.

Some ballots received from organizations showed that the vote was the majority opinion of the organization and the number taking part in the discussion was given. The number of voters represented by these organizations was over 1500 but the actual number of voters was not given because some organizations did not give the number of their members taking part in casting the ballot.

In preparing the ballot the state chamber received a mass of suggestions and many voters gave their opinions on the several questions proposed.

The ballot was carried to the December issue of the Idaho Taxer, a weekly publication of the state chamber of commerce, and was mailed to approximately 7000 voters in the state. The ballot consisted of all walks of life and of the various industries of the state.
