ATLANTIC BOATS STILL HARASSED BY HEAVY GALES

Rescue Efforts Pushed for Three Vessels Lost On the Ocean
FIVE DESTROYERS HUNT FOR MISSING TRAWLER
Wrecking Tug Goes to Help Freighter Drifting With No Rudder

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (UP)—Atlantic shipping still was harassed by northwest gales today as rescue efforts were pushed for three vessels whose fate and whereabouts were unknown.
Five destroyers left New York today to hunt for the steam trawler Betsey, missing with 20 crew and the New England, a tug, which had broken down but that she would survive.

The tug was out of the wrecking tug Relief had gone to the aid of the Norwegian freighter Farinham, which was broken under 700 miles east of Bermuda. Other ships in the vicinity joined the hunt for the tug. There were 25 men on the Farinham.
Nothing has been heard from the Italian freighter Trossa, which went out on S. O. S. last Friday. The vessel carried about 100 men and a cargo of sugar.

Order Restored In Chinese Province

HONG KONG, Jan. 29 (UP)—Order has been restored at Canton, China, in Kwang-Si province, after a revolt by the second division of the Chinese army, which looted Hong-Kong and "long-chow" refugees received here today.
The revolt was a result of the army's capture of Canton, an important city in northwestern Kwang-Si province, reports from Canton said.
The third army division, commanded by General Ho, has gone to Wan-Hsin, from Nanchuan to restore order.

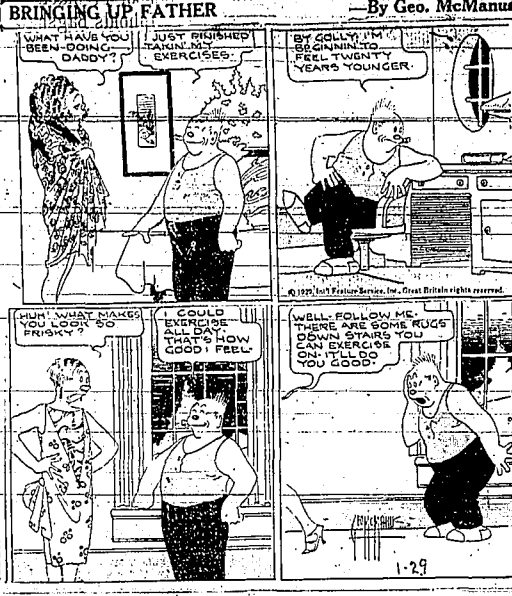

COMMUNISTS ARE STILL ACTIVE IN LABOR QUESTIONS

Book of Party in England Reveals Hand of Communists in Strikes Made in This Land

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (UP)—Communist activities, which are described by the State Department as the principle bar against American recognition of Soviet Russia, had more influence over the major labor troubles in this country during the recent year.

The official book of the British Communist Party gives details of the activities of American Communists in industrial disputes.

The only strike for which the Communist claim sole responsibility was at Fawcett where the strike "which was the result of wage cuts, involved 100,000 textile workers who were totally unorganized, and was led by Communists," the book says.

In the farmers' strike, the Communists do not figure in the report, but it is stated that President Green of the American Federation of Labor was defeated in an attempt to obtain control of the strike, and that the strike was won in a "crushing defeat for the A. F. of L. bureaucrats."

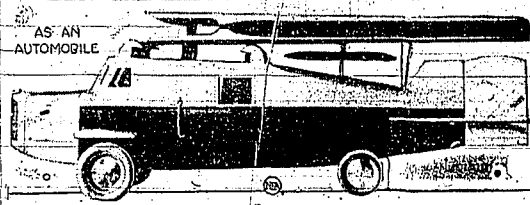
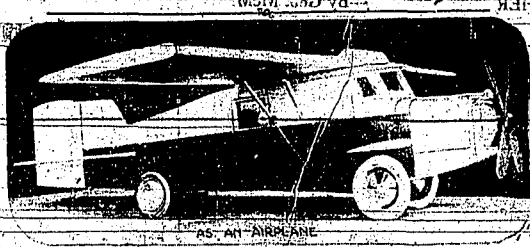

Liquid Coal Now To Revolutionize English Industry

LONDON, Jan. 29 (UP)—Just at the moment of Great Britain's deepest despair over the future of her coal industry a new method of pulverizing coal has been discovered, which it is confidently expected, in many quarters, will enable coal to displace oil as ships' fuel and restore prosperity to Britain's second greatest industry.

In this new process coal is pulverized to an extremely fine powder and then "blended" with a film of inert gas which surrounds every particle of fuel. The effect is to create a liquid fuel.

In this form the coal is cheaper than oil, and it can be carried by ship through pipe lines in the same way that fluid oil is carried.
