1929 Wool Clip Prices Puzzle Sheep Raisers

What will the 1929 wool clip bring? That is one of the principal topics of conversation with sheep raisers and wool buyers at this season and to the large number of them. Luck on the north and south side of the Snake as well as the fact that several large outfits have their headquarters in the Snake valley is one of timely discussion.

The very few buyers have made their bids for the clip in the past year, which is rather unusual, but the producers apparently are not worrying and many have expressed the opinion that the market will be better than last year, particularly as regards crossbred wools.

Operators show considerable hesitancy in lining up contracts for the new clip and, according to the January issue of the National Wool Grower, the wool contracts started several weeks later than last season.

It is not always possible to get an actual buying price for the clip, as is shown in the early reports, those outside of the western Colorado area, particularly north of the Snake, are said to have been 5 to 75 per cent above last year's opening price in the early part of the season.

There is a growing disposition to "lay off" the wool clip, especially since the new level of goods prices is not particularly as established and wool conditions in the West have not been especially conducive to contracting for the clip.

From a world standpoint it is stated that a strong undercurrent exists in all markets and under discussion of the wool clip market the situation is summarized as follows: Australia, Zealandia, and the Pacific markets are all strong, but some are slow, particularly in Japan and the Continent, being strong competitors for the wool clip.

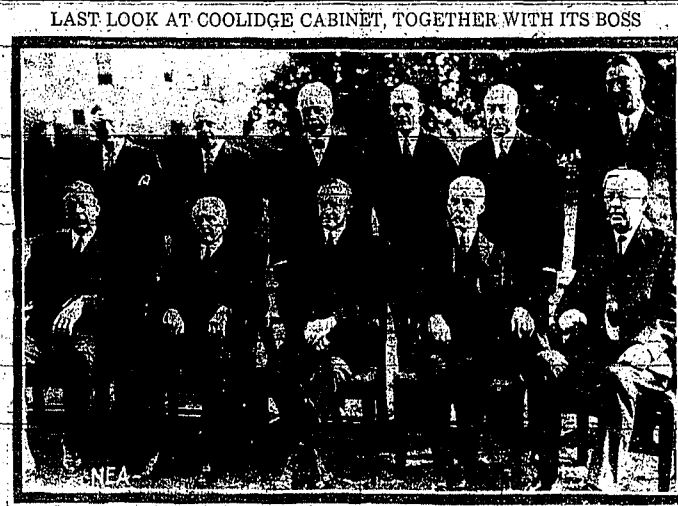

RAILROAD MERGER VEXING QUESTION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (UP)—National consolidation, one of the most important and vexing questions that have faced the Coolidge administration, is being discussed by railway authorities here to be approaching some definite solution.

President Coolidge and President-elect Hoover are anxious to have the legislative angle of the "merger problem" cleared up prior to next March 31. The administration is pushing a merger plan for the nation's railways.

In the transportation act of 1920, Congress authorized the commission to formulate and publish a general merger plan for the nation's railways. The commission has never presented a complete plan and has three times asked congress to be relieved of this duty.

The committee has already investigated postmaster appointments in North Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi, and it has been informed conditions in the three states compared with those reported in states already investigated.

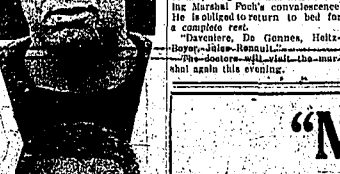
Butler Leaders Marshal Foch Has Relapse Of Illness

RESTORING LIFE SCIENTIST'S HOPE



Apparatus Constructed to Take the Place of the Heart and Keep Life in Bodies

MOSKOW, Jan. 31 (AP)—Doctors here, by which young Russian scientist has a worst heart, the machine is impressive in its simplicity and is made of glass, metal and rubber, a total cost of \$10,000. The theory of the experiment is that if the blood can be kept from coagulating after death, the body should remain as restored to life.

The Russian scientist hopes to keep the blood a fluid by means of a special pump which circulates the heart to restore the body to its normal function.

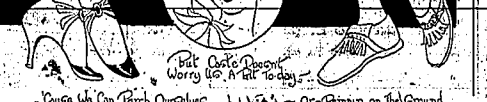
