McMILLIN MAKES SCORING HONORS

Seta Record for Clean Ball
The University of Idaho, Moscow, March 1 (Special)—Frank McMILLIN, Pocatello, University of Idaho basketball scoring ace, topped all individual scorers of the northern division of the Pacific Northwest conference for 1928-29 with 127 points, a record that work has revealed. Not only did McMILLIN lead all scorers, but he set a new record for 10 conference games, averaging nearly 13 points per contest.

Harold Stowell, also of Pocatello and McMILLIN's rooming mate, was barely tossed out of several high individual honors by Jaffee, Washington, midway, scoring 102 to 36 for Stowell, Washington, and Jaffee, who rated three leaders in the highest circle of the conference season. Last year Gary Dunford, Oregon, was high with 114 points in 10 games.

McMILLIN further set a record for playing the cleanest basketball, the conference having only one personal foul called upon him in 10 conference games. Captain Edwin E. Burghard, Huxley, Ore., was not for Jaffee, McMILLIN and only Jaffee, McMILLIN registered applications.

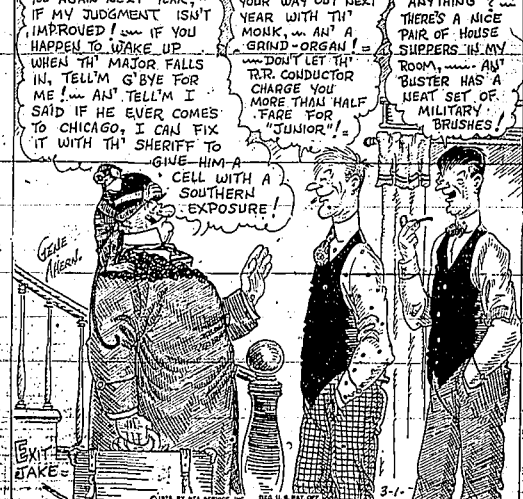

LOCAL EXCHANGE ANNOUNCES NEW SERVICE RATES

According to an announcement made this morning by the local exchange of the Twin Falls telephone company, the rates for long distance calls will be reduced in charges, effective today, for connecting new or additional telephone facilities in the home or office and for changing existing equipment.

The announcement says: "This is in accord with the local system's policy of providing the lowest possible cost to the public."

It was pointed out that the new low charges will not affect the regular monthly charges, the reductions being made for the convenience of the public.

The specific reductions are as follows: The charge for connecting long distance calls from \$2.50 to \$3.00. The charge for connecting business long distance calls has been cut from \$3.00 to \$2.50. The charge for connecting residence telephone or long distance calls has been cut from \$2.50 to \$2.00.

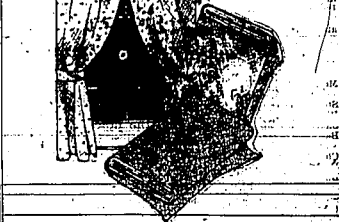

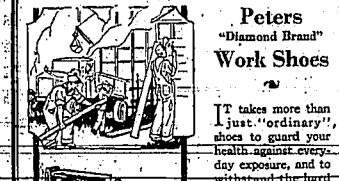
