COVERING UP.

EVENTS transpiring at Boise are sketchy; we know them on the outskirts are to sketch them up with a longing that statesmanship might come into fashion and politics be hanned to the smallest, furthest corner. Undoubtedly, we long in vain.

The five cent gas tax appears to be a certainty for Idaho, as this is written. Whether it is good business that the state should impose its rate another cent per gallon on this tax is a moot question. Quite a few of us wondered if we were not getting up in the clouds with a rate of four cents? What is good business for the state does not enter into the situation for any serious consideration, however. The real crux of the situation undoubtedly is that the state has such a big deficit in its highway construction campaign that more money must be provided, let the results be what they may.

The gas tax is to be boosted in an effort to save the face of the present state administration. Much highway construction was done last year. It is barely possible, of course, that the units of construction made it seem advisable to those in charge to keep crews and machinery at work for a longer time than was economically sound. Again, the fact that a state and national election was held last November may have been responsible for the fact that the state did road work far beyond its ability to pay out of current funds.

People vote and they need roads, and administrations are determined by votes.

When we come right down to brass tacks, the state of Idaho 'on its 1928 road construction program overdrawn its bank account.

There is a big deficit, according to all reports. Just how many contractors are still holding the sack, and the amount of money that is due them the public is still permitted to guess. If the people have been taken into the confidence of the administration on this very important point, this newspaper is uninformed of it.

The governor is also determined that we shall have a sales tax. His cigarette tax proposal was killed. According to a United Press item carried in the Evening Times Friday, the administration forces are back now with a "bill" that would tax all tobacco 12-1/2 percent. The second proposal is fairer than the first in that it does not propose to put all the sales tax burden on one form of tobacco. The mere fact that tobacco alone is to be discriminated against and made to carry the burden of "equalizing taxes" when a lower sales tax spread farther and thinner might do the job without proving so burdensome to any one branch of business strikes us as disquieting to say the least.

The Evening Times is convinced that the real purpose behind the sales tax legislation is not so much to provide revenue as to embarrass the tobacco business. In other words, our so-called morals are to be improved by further prohibitory legislation. The bootleg business is receiving an invitation to broaden its nefarious practices, and the state administration is in the position of sponsoring the invitation.

Leadership? Hardly. Just politics. Idaho must live it through. We people would clean house.

COOPERATIVES IN BIG BUSINESS

MANY farmer owned and controlled cooperatives, says the United States Department of Agriculture, are now in the "big-business" class.

The 12 associations with the National Livestock Producers Association, Chicago, handled livestock to the value of \$138,000,000 in 1928. The California Fruit Growers' Exchange, Los Angeles, sold citrus fruit for its 206 local units to the value of \$96,500,000 during the 12 months ending October 31, last.

The Dairymen's League Cooperative Association, New York, representing 71,000 dairymen, sold products valued at \$82,500,000 in the year ending March 31, 1928.

The 13 affiliated associations of the American Cotton Growers' Exchange, Dallas, Texas, had sales of \$70,900,000 for 1927-28.

Some other "big-business" cooperatives and their sales are: Land O'Lakes Creameries (Inc.), Minneapolis, a federation of more than 100 creameries, about \$60,000,000; Central Cooperative Association, South St. Paul, selling agent for livestock shipping associations in five states, \$30,000,000; Interstate Milk Producers, Philadelphia, acting for 25,968 Cooperative Egg and Poultry Association, Seattle, 8,183 members, approximately \$19,000,000; Staple Cotton Cooperative Association, Greenwood, Miss., \$16,800,000; Challenge Cream and Butter Association, Los Angeles, approximately \$16,000,000.

COLD HELPS MINERS

IT IS the old adage says; a very ill-wind that blows no good to someone.

A frightful cold wave has gripped Europe recently, causing a great amount of suffering and death. But to England it has been a blessing in disguise.

The unprecedented cold weather has caused a new demand in Europe for England's coal. Thus England's most ailing industry has been given temporary stimulation. The net gain has not been great enough to be sure to relieve the depression in the industry as a whole; but it has enabled some

mines to remain open when otherwise would have been shut down, and it has kept a few, at least, of England's despondent miners in funds for a brief time.

AN AVERAGE ROBBERY NETS \$30.75

DESPITE the large-scale holdups and robberies that are reported daily, Warden Lewis E. Lawes of Sing Sing prison doesn't believe that crime pays.

The warden studied some figures in his penitentiary the other day, and discovered that the average robbery, during the year 1927, netted precisely \$30.75. Sentences for these robberies, in turn, averaged better than 13 years

To be sure, these figures were taken from records of convicts—the men who got caught. If the figures of those who escaped were added in, the profits might average higher and the sentences lower. But it's a good indication, just the same. Crime isn't, after all, very profitable.

IDAHO'S PRESTIGE

(Editorial Note.)

Idaho has no more nobly equal, as an agricultural state, than is Idaho with its expansive territory, out a glance at recently compiled production statistics will attest the truth of the statement. The state ranks first in the number of sheep herds, clever men, steel beam houses, Grimm alfalfa seed and wheat. Then Idaho stands second in acre-yield of potatoes, corn and oats, third in cane hay and barley, and fifth in cheese production.

The state's butter production exceeds 20,000,000 pounds annually. In 1927 the state produced 6,000,000 bushels of apples, ranking third in the number of cattle and hogs. That same season poultry shipments exceeded 15,000 carloads of live birds and eggs, accounted for 215 cars. Dressed poultry shipments exceed 200 cars annually. In 1927 Idaho has produced enough honey to fill a freight car.

These figures are a striking testimonial to the fertility of Idaho's soil. They prove conclusively that there is no problem of production but rather of marketing and distribution. We must direct our efforts along that line.






