DYNAMITE BLOWS UP BARN; KILLS FIRE FIGHTERS
Your Firemen Dead; Four Aro Fatally Wounded and Seventeen Hurt

EXPLOSIVE USED FOR BREAKING ICE JAMES
Volunteer Fire Department - Fight Blaze; Cities Near - Are Shaken

PROBABLY NEARLY 1000 dynamite bombs exploded in the town of Twin Falls, Idaho, Saturday night, blowing up a barn and killing seven firemen and wounding 17 others.

The dynamite was used in the breaking up of the ice in the Snake river. The explosion occurred at 11:30 p. m. and was heard for miles around.

The fire burned for several hours before being extinguished. The cause of the explosion is still under investigation.

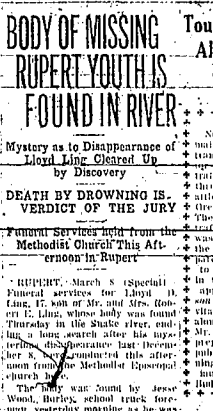

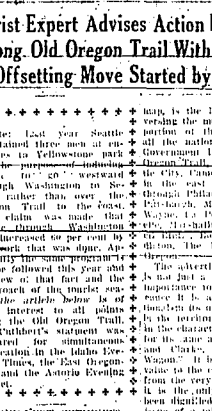
