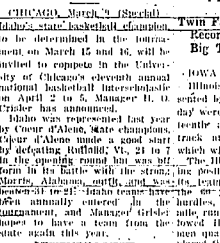

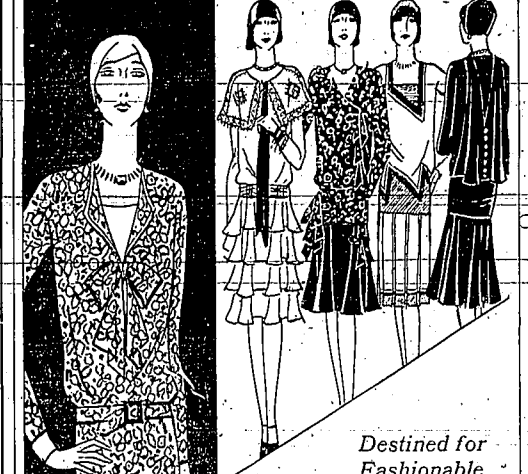

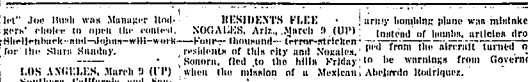

BUSINESS SUCCEEDS WHERE THE COURTS FAILED NO SINGLE act of any big business in recent years has so caught the interest of the public as the action that was taken by the stockholders of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana in ousting Col. Robert W. Stewart from the board of directors of the company.

There has been little doubt as to the side the general public took in the battle since the Rockefeller defined their stand. The younger Rockefeller has so conducted himself as to win for himself an affection in the hearts of the people such as is seldom vouchsafed the son of a very rich man.

Another reason why the public has been quick to respond in this case is that the battle represented what the public believed was an honest effort on the part of a big corporation to put into effect a house cleaning, extending in this case particularly to one man.

Heretofore, it has been all too true that after a prominent man has faced the court and has managed to wriggle loose, by means of a technicality or by any other means that he carried on in his business, little the worse, if his skin was tough for his court experiences.

May this trend in big business continue and become more clearly defined. Corporations have come a long distance in their methods of improving business, but in the public mind there is still enough room for more progress to be made to cause a real thrill to be felt at the moral fibre and stamina of leadership in a corporation such as the Rockefellers have just displayed in striking fashion.

PROTECTIVE STEPS NEEDED WITH the tourist season approaching the advice contained in a story by Herbert Cuthbert in this paper yesterday is worthy of consideration by towns along the Old Oregon Trail. So little seems bent upon keeping men in or near Yellowstone park with a view to sending traffic over the northern route west. They did that last year and claimed an increase of 60 per cent in travel through Washington to Pu-

get Sound. That necessarily reduced travel through Idaho and Oregon over the Oregon trail. The theory seems to be held in Seattle that if tourists come west to Portland over the Oregon Trail and Columbia highway many of them go southward and do not visit Puget sound cities. Therefore the idea of promoting the northern route.

If such tactics are continued there will be no course open to Oregon and Idaho towns along the trail save to cooperate with a view to meeting this attack. It should be possible to do this at comparatively small expense if the work is properly organized and all towns contribute according to their interests in the subject. We have the most noted highway of them all and no other route offers superior scenic advantages. The highway along the Columbia to Portland follows a water grade and the route is dustless, the highway being either paved or oiled through most of the distance in southern Idaho. The official highway maps afford the tourist the most accurate information to be had and travellers should be urged to get the truth from such sources rather than from prejudiced quarters.

Since we have a splendid highway we should get the good out of it. The tourist business means much to everyone and it is objectionable to see traffic diverted by methods followed by Seattle last year.

REDUCING RAIL CASUALTIES IN 1928 the railroads of the country surveyed their employe casualty record and resolved to cut it by at least 35 per cent by 1930. As a result, various safety campaigns were inaugurated, old hazards were eliminated, and employers and employes cooperated to take the element of danger out of the railroad worker's job.

A bulletin from the Committee on Public Relations of the Eastern Railroads shows how well the job has been done. With 1930 nearly a year away, the railroads have already passed their own goal. They have reduced employe casualties by more than 47 per cent since 1923.

Best Editorial of the Day NOT IMPRESSED (Portland Oregonian)

The attempt to abolish capital punishment as a penalty for murder, promulgated and approved, has been defeated again in the Washington legislature. The experience of countries which enforce it indicates that it is a deterrent. Without reference to these, however, it is undebatable that it is a deterrent of reputation by the same murderer. Because, says the lawyer, it is irrevocable. Why not? Because, it is urged, jurists more and more refuse to convict in first-degree murder cases. The option of fixing the penalty is life imprisonment is undebatable in justice, dispensation of that. Because capital punishment is an "alternative method of murder." In short, the way to prevent crime is to make it more costly. Because it inflicts shame and suffering on the relatives of the condemned. So does imprisonment. The United States has the most expensive families in one there does not seem to be any way to relieve by statute. Because it is a talking to prison officials and prison inmates. A bare assertion, and in any event not permanent to the issue, which, if necessary killing the attacker. The state is no more a murderer when it protects its citizens than is the citizen himself when he performs the same act with his own hands. Because we do not want the United States to be the last country to take this step. We are not resigning the moral policies of other countries, having enough to do to take care of our own. The lawyer fails to mention that the very execution of the law would be a powerful agency in securing lesser punishments. We have in mind the notorious D'Amore case, a conviction and effective club behind the door. If capital punishment is to be abolished, we think it not unreasonable to ask that the murderers make the first move.
