CITY BEAUTIFUL

TWIN FALLS, American Falls and Boise are showing interest in community beautification projects", says an announcement from the school of forestry of the University.

It will soon be time to plant ornamental woodlot and windbreak tree stock and the interest in community beautification projects should not be confined to just three cities in the state.

Now is the time to plan tree planting which will add to the aesthetic value and beautification of the landscape and although Twin Falls is well and favorably known for its wide streets lined with shade trees, yet we would be vain indeed if we could not see means of improvement. Indeed, there are many sites available where the planting of trees would add materially to the attractiveness of homes and to the beauty of the city.

Visitors in the Twin Falls community are unable to believe that the city came into being just 20 years ago and call attention to the majestic trees along the "parking of our ancestors" and in our parks. In fact the trees alone give Twin Falls a prestige that could not have been acquired in any other manner.

Some tree varieties planted here in the early day were not particularly adaptable to the climate, but the school of forestry is in a position to give accurate advice on tree varieties that will give the most satisfactory results. The black locust does exceptionally well in this district.

Planting experts at the university hold that the shipping season for the sowing of 1929 will be short and there is no time like the present for placing orders with some reliable nursery or the state nursery.

Let us plan tree planting now for 1929 so that the Twin Falls of the future may maintain its prestige as the beautiful home city of Idaho.

RELATED SUBJECTS

THOSE who like their liquor and are opposed to real enforcement of prohibition laws may have groaned when they read a United Press story in the Evening Times Wednesday headed, "Effect of Jones Bill Being Felt in Idaho," in which was set forth some of the penalties that the federal government will seek to have imposed against offenders. The article in part was as follows:

"As a result of a sweeping order, federal agents of any character, the civil courts and prison conviction will place claims for the government on the following basis:—
"An tax of \$1,000 for the manufacture of intoxicating liquors, whether by private distilleries, by public屋, or by a hotel or restaurant."

"Tax of \$100 for retailing intoxicating preparations of any character. It's estimated that this will hit one out of every 100,000 persons."

"An additional tax of \$100, or 'double tax,' for not having made application for a license before manufacture."

Such a course of procedure, if followed, is likely to make the lot of the merry bootlegger a hard one, indeed. There may be wailing and gnashing of teeth.

Just below the above mentioned story appeared an article bearing a Peoria, Illinois, dateline in which the information was given that the state's attorney there would ask for the death penalty against the wholesale bootlegger who is alleged to have distributed moonshine that caused the death of 17 individuals.

ARISTOCRATIC SPUDS
"The common Irish potato is one of the best staple foods," said Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, in an address before the American Association of Potato Growers, at their recent convention in New York. "That the potato," said Doctor Kellogg, "is a food product of unusual excellence has been demonstrated by a number of competent investigators through exact studies in nutrition laboratories.

"I would not, however, wish to be understood as advocating the potato as an exclusive diet. Its protein, while of excellent quality, is improved by being supplemented by such proteins as are found in nuts and milk, the soy bean and other oily seeds, and in eggs. A diet consisting of potatoes, butter milk and a liberal supply of spinach or other greens, with fresh or canned tomatoes would constitute a well-balanced and very inexpensive diet. You must not forget to use also the water in which the potatoes were boiled as many vitamins and salts are found therein.

The white potato is an excellent blood-building food. Comparing equal food values, the potato contains as much iron as a medium beefsteak.

"A still more precious dietary property of the potato is its remarkable richness in alkaline food salts. Food is fuel and the vital combustions of the body produce acid products just as does the burning of fuel in a furnace. It is on this account that the blood is alkaline. A certain reserve of alkali in the blood is essential that the poisonous acid products of muscle work and other bodily activities may be quickly neutralized and removed.

"It would be safe to predict that the substitution of potatoes for half the cereal foods now eaten and nine-tenths or even all of the meat consumed would result in the addition of ten years to the life of the average citizen, and doubling his efficiency.

CRIMINALS AT THE WHEEL

OFFENDANT, one would say that the truly dangerous law-breaker is the man who commits some major crime—murder, robbery, burglary, or the like—rather than the citizen who violates the traffic laws.

But there are times when the traffic law-violator is a menace of the first water.

In Kansas City recently, a drunken man drove his car down a street at 40 miles an hour, ignored police signals to stop, and finally crashed into a group of school children who were crossing the street. By a miracle, no one was killed, although three of the youngsters were painfully hurt.

This driver never had committed any crime. He had the best intentions in the world. Yet, at that particular time, he was the most dangerous man in Kansas City. A year in the penitentiary would be a very moderate punishment for him to pay.

TAFT IS ESTEEMED

IT IS to be hoped that the rumors that Chief Justice William Howard Taft will retire in the near future are incorrect.

The chief justice has revealed a good deal of ability and a vast fund of level-headedness and devotion to duty during his time on the bench. Judges of his caliber are not too easily found. It is true that he has never been numbered among the court's "liberal" with Brandeis and Holmes. But few liberals, for all that, would be pleased if he were to step down. The country needs him where he is, and his retirement would be met with almost universal regret.


Snow and hot water are not supposed to have much in common, but we know a lot of farmers who have been in hot water since the snow came to interrupt spring weather and spring work.
