**CITY BEAUTIFUL**

**IDAHO FALLS, American Falls and Boise** are showing interest in community beautification projects," says an announcement from the school of forestry of the University.

It will soon be time to plant ornamentals, and windbreak trees, and the interest in community beautification projects should not be confined to just three cities in the state.

Now is the time to plan tree planting which will add to the aesthetic value and beautification of the landscape and although Twin Falls is well and favorably known for its wide streets lined with shade trees, yet we would be vain indeed if we could not see means of improvement. Indeed, there are many sites available, where the planting of trees would add materially to the attractiveness of homes and to the beauty of the city.

Visitors in the Twin Falls community are unable to believe that the city came into being just 25 years ago and call attention to the majestic trees along the parking of our avenues and in our parks. Planting experts at the university hold that the shipping season for the spring of 1929 will be short and there is no time like the present for placing orders with some reliable nursery of the state nursery.

Let us plan tree planting now for 1929 so that the Twin Falls of the future may maintain its prestige as the beautiful home city of Idaho.

**RELATED SUBJECTS**

**HOSE** who like their liquor and are opposed to law enforcement or prohibition laws may have groaned when they read a United Press story in the Evening Times Wednesday headed, "Effect of Jones Bill Being Felt in Idaho," in which was set forth some of the penalties that the federal government will seek to have imposed against offenders. The article in part was as follows:

"As a result of the sweeping federal prohibition law made by the civil courts and upon conviction, will place claims for the government on the following basis:
 

- 1. A fine of \$1,000 for the manufacture of intoxicating liquor, whether by private distillation or otherwise.
- 2. A fine of \$100 for retailing intoxicating liquors.
- 3. A fine of \$500 for the sale of intoxicating liquor.
- 4. Tax of \$4.00 per gallon on each gallon found by investigators.
- 5. An additional tax of \$100, or "double tax" for having made application for a license before manufacturing.

 Such a course of procedure, if followed, is likely to make the lot of the merry bootlegger a hard one, indeed. There may be wailing and gnashing of teeth."

Just below the above mentioned story appeared an article bearing a Peoria, Illinois, dateline in which the information was given that the state's attorney there would ask for the death penalty against the wholesale bootlegger who is alleged to have distributed moonshine that caused the death of 17 individuals.

**ARISTOCRATIC SPUDS**

"THE common Irish potato is one of the best staple foods," said Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, in an address before the American Association of Potato Growers, at their recent convention in New York. "That the potato," said Doctor Kellogg, "is a food product of unusual excellence has been demonstrated by a number of competent investigators through exact studies in nutrition laboratories."

"I would not, however, wish to be understood as advocating the potato as an exclusive diet. Its protein, while of excellent quality, is improved by being supplemented by such proteins as are found in nuts and milk, the soy bean and other oily seeds, and in eggs. A diet consisting of potatoes, butter-milk and a liberal supply of spinach or other greens, with fresh or canned tomatoes would constitute a well-balanced and very inexpensive diet. You must not forget to use also the water in which the potatoes were boiled as many vitamins and salts are found therein."

"The white potato is an excellent blood-building food. Comparing equal food values, the potato contains as much iron as a medium beefsteak."

"A still more precious dietic property of the potato is its remarkable richness in alkaline food salts. Food is fuel and the vital constituents of the body produce acid products which as they do the burning of fuel in a furnace, so in this account that the blood is alkaline. A certain reserve of alkali in the blood is essential that the poisonous acid products of muscle work and other bodily activities may be quickly neutralized and removed."

"It would be safe to predict that the substitution of potatoes for half the cereal foods now eaten and nine-tenths or even all of the meat consumed would result in the addition of ten years to the life of the average citizen, and doubling his efficiency."

**CRIMINALS AT THE WHEEL**

**OFFHAND**, one would say that the truly dangerous law-breaker is the man who commits some major crime—murder, robbery, burglary or the like—rather than the citizen who violates the traffic laws.

But there are times when the traffic law violator is a menace of the first water.

In Kansas City recently, a drunken man drove his car down a street at 40 miles an hour, ignored police signals to stop, and finally crashed into a group of school children who were crossing the street. By a miracle, no one was killed, although three of the youngsters were painfully hurt.

This driver never had committed any crime. He had the best intentions in the world. Yet, at that particular time, he was the most dangerous man in Kansas City. A year in the penitentiary would be a very moderate penalty for him to pay.

**TART IS ESTEEMED**

IT IS to be hoped that the rumors that Chief Justice William Howard Taft will retire in the near future are incorrect.

The chief justice has revealed a good deal of ability and a vast fund of level-headedness and devotion to duty during his time on the bench. Judges of his caliber are not too easily found.

It is true that he has never been numbered among the court's "liberals" by Brandeis and Holmes. But few liberals, for all that, would be pleased if he were to step down. The country needs him where he is, and his retirement would be met with almost universal regret.

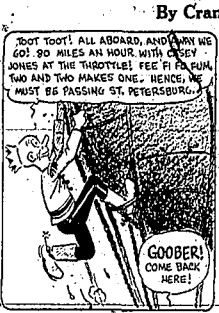
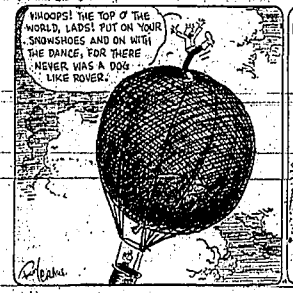
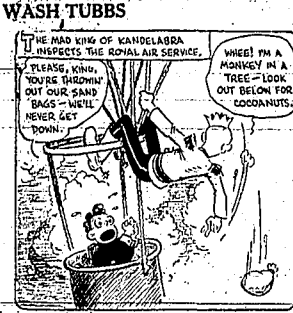

**A MERITORIOUS BILL**

A bill providing for an increase in the salaries of district and supreme judges, awaits the attention of the senate. The present salaries are \$4,000 for district and \$5,000 for supreme judges. The measure would increase the pay to \$6,000 and \$8,000 respectively, thus making the remuneration reasonably consistent with the character of service necessary.

The public aims to choose its supreme and district judges from among the most learned and trustworthy lawyers available. Under present conditions lawyers at all times for the positions will earn more in private practice than through service on the bench. If choosing material for the supreme and district benches the public demands the very best attainable. Nothing less will be tolerated. This being true, the remuneration for the respective high positions should be at least moderately comparable to what private attorneys are required to receive for other ways of employment.



**TODAY IS THE ANNIVERSARY**

**WHITNEY'S INVENTION**

One hundred and thirty-five years ago today, on March 14, 1794 Eli Whitney secured a patent on the cotton gin and laid the foundation for the civil war.

An article written in our history has had a greater effect upon the political and economic life of this nation than the invention of this mechanical means to separate the seed from cotton fiber. Before this invention, from eight to ten hours were required to clean one pound of cotton. Since one field hand could produce about 2500 lbs. a year, it took 25 slaves working 100 days to get the cotton ready for market. The invention of the cotton gin, however, reduced the cost of cleaning cotton to one-tenth of the former cost.

The south soon found cotton growing to be its most important industry. Slaves became increasingly in demand to grow it, and thus began differences between the north and south which resulted in the Civil War.

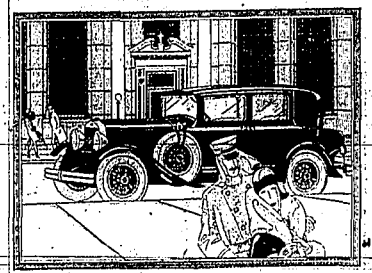

# EFFICIENCY IN WHITE HOUSE IS HOOVER'S PLAN

New President Able to Get Away from Desk and Duties Earlier than Calvin Coolidge

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—President Hoover has introduced the famous efficiency methods

of the department of commerce at the White House, he got away from his desk usually about an hour earlier in the afternoon than did President Coolidge.

The secret is the mysterious Hoover efficiency which has characterized the president in what ever post he held. And the key to that efficiency, says the president, never permits himself to be stalled by a knotty problem. When he comes to a difficult question he puts it in the back of his head and thinks about it constantly until a solution presents itself. Meanwhile he is busy with other matters.

Mr. Coolidge, on the other hand, is usually in his study at 11 o'clock, working directly to the executive mansion for lunch. He is back at his desk by 2:30, sometimes a few minutes earlier. Usually he finishes the day at 5 o'clock.

It is in his White House study, after dinner, he calls up the more knotty problems. There, with his cigar and his books, he weighs the pros and cons of the more delicate problems of policy. Frequently he calls in George Akerly, his secretary, to discuss upon his arrival at the executive office in the morning and ratifies or final decisions on two or three major questions while lunching at the White House.

Mr. Hoover took over the place. The Hoover chairs, books, reading table and cigar stand have been transplanted from "S" street, and the room rearranged to duplicate the study at the former Hoover home.

Mr. Hoover has never taken any systematic exercise, and he does not contemplate starting now. He regards his health as simply living and by always getting plenty of sleep.

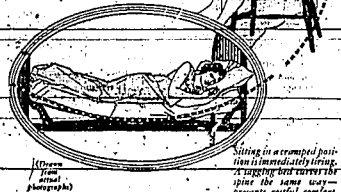

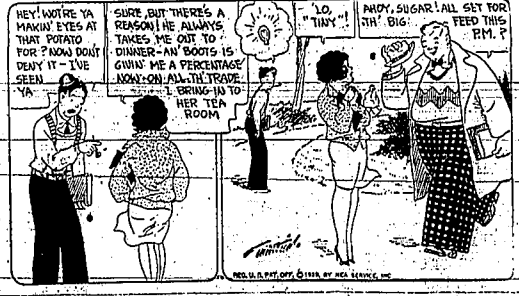
