The plans for the new hatchery were made by William Klot, state fish commissioner, and J. H. Morgan, and it is to be modern in every respect. The cost for the hatchery are expected to be delivered here about April 15 or 16, and an effort is to be made to complete the building, and have it in readiness for operation by the first of April.

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## Property Value Of Twin Falls School District Is Varied

Intersting data has been compiled in regard to variations of property value, enrollment of students and the number of teachers employed in the Twin Falls independent school district during the school year of 1929-30 to the present time.

The compilation shows an assessed valuation of \$1,000,000 at the present time, as compared to \$100,000 in 1921. The faculty, exclusive of principals and supervisors, totaled 112 in 1929-30, as compared to 22, the lowest number, from 1921 to 1923. The number of students enrolled in the schools last year totaled 3168, the greatest number in the history of the schools, and a material increase is expected for this year's records.

The grand jury began its investigation after Miss Hudson's collapse from use of drugs.

Miss Hudson is confined to the state narcotics hospital, at Spaulding. The grand jury began its investigation when it was reported that Dr. Greer had made a "compromise" with "certain" with the government.

Miss Hudson was confined to Spaulding at the request of her husband, Ricardo Greer, and her mother, Mrs. Theresa Hudson. Her collapse was preceded by a series of difficulties which kept her in the hospital.



PROGRESSIVE FARMERS.

IN THIS commercial age we are prone, possibly too prone, to measure the success of individuals and communities by the yardstick of profits made. If a business makes money it is a success, and if it makes a big amount of money it is a big success.

After all, such a yardstick does a pretty good job of measuring purely business ventures, and it is foolish to dispute its measurements. Another criterion can be applied to give us a more enlightened comprehension of the character of a community.

A field man working for a farm machinery company who travels through this territory periodically talked shop the other day. He has found that farmers in this part of the Snake river valley are the heaviest buyers of modern farm machinery in this whole inter-mountain country.

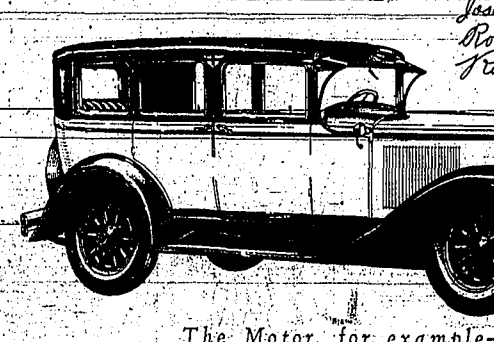


