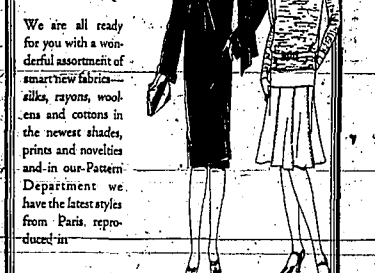

Charles Eggleston, late insolvent suit in the district court against C. P. 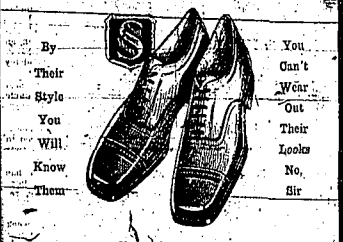

### FIVE YOUNG MEN AND WOMEN HELD

Authorities Believe They Have Over-Comped Gang That Made \$5,000 Monthly

BRADY, Texas, March 22 (AP)—Five young men and women arrested in jail here today charged with the robbery of a bank here on February 24, 1920, and the robbery of the Farmers and Merchants State bank here Thursday.

Those arrested are R. C. Turner, 21; H. H. Smith, 21; J. W. Smith, 21; D. W. Smith, 21; and J. E. Smith, 21. All are members of a young set living in Brady with the exception of D. W. Smith, who is said to be from Austin.

A fourth jail is held for questioning but no charges have been filed against her. Officers said she was from DeWitt, Texas.

The robbery was carried out with the aid of professional holdup men and a wave of excitement swept through the West Texas town as a result of the robbery spread. The population of Brady is about 1,000.

Harold Johnson, father, and Mrs. P. H. Smith, mother, were the only persons in the bank when a young man with a handkerchief entered, furnished a pistol, and ordered Johnson to hand over the money.

Soon after the robbery the same was repeated at the home of J. H. Smith, who is the father of the young man who is believed to be in possession of the money.

**A HEALTH UNIT**  
**PEOPLE** of this county now face the obligation of giving serious thought to the advisability of establishing a full time public health unit for the county. Through co-operation on the part of the United States health service, the Rockefeller foundation and the state welfare department half of the money required for establishing such a unit can be secured from these three agencies on condition that the county match the \$5,400 and thus make available \$10,800.

The unit for this county will include a physician trained in preventive medicine and sanitation, two trained nurses, a sanitary inspector, and a clerical assistant for office work. All members of the unit will give full time to their work.

Dr. Covington showed in his talk that if the saving of life by use of the unit should be one life per 1,000 population, the saving in a county of this size would amount to \$54,000 annually, giving each human life a value of \$1,800 and not counting the saving in bills incurred for medical attention, nursing etc. Forgetting the more important element of human welfare, health and happiness and putting the matter on a cold cash, materialistic basis, expenditure of the money is wise, particularly in view of epidemic conditions that have prevailed during the past winter.

The Evening Times telephoned the county commissioners to find what, if any, difference the cost to the county will be if the county health unit is secured. M. C. Ware, commissioner, answered the telephone.

He was asked what the overhead cost of the present part time health unit costs the county. In the absence of definite figures, he estimated that in ordinary years the cost is about \$2,800 annually. During the past year, he said he thought the extra cost, due to the epidemic, would run probably between \$5,000 and \$6,000 more than usual.

In other words, during this past winter the county has had to spend two or three thousand dollars more for its health department work than the full time health unit would cost the county for its share of expense.

"Please get it straight that the county commissioners are not promoting a county health unit," Mr. Ware stated.

From the point of view of human welfare the Evening Times is convinced the health unit is necessary. From the point of view of an investment it is also sound. And if it can be utilized as to require no added tax dollars and can actually be made to yield dividends in lives saved and money saved, then this county has every reason for going ahead and securing the unit with as little delay as possible.

It has everything in its favor. It deserves the most serious, studied consideration. If should, we believe, be adopted in this county.

**ONE VIEW OF GANG MURDERS**  
 A MAGAZINE-writer recently interviewed a Chicago business man on the general subject of gang murders, which-Chicago has-made-famous.

The business man didn't think such affairs were very important.

"They're not killing law-abiding citizens," he said. "They're just killing each other. What difference does it make to decent people whether the gangsters-kill each other or wait for the police to do it?"

At first glance that sounds like good sense. But on reflection it is easy to see that it makes a good deal of difference. The police have shown a lamentable inability to bring the major gangsters to book. People will not testify against them—because they fear the gangsters' guns.

These gang shootings help the underworld to maintain its power over its victims. Until they're broken up the underworld will continue to operate unchecked.

**WHEN TRILLIUMS BLOOM**  
 (Green-Journal)

Snatched in with statements concerning factor trials and the pepper was a small item that many failed to see.

And yet it was a news report of first importance with the great land of childhood. It was first reported in the Green-Journal.

"For days and days the curly-headed boy and the quiet-eyed girl have looked in the mossy spaces between the fir trees in the clearing, and the lane laid by the path that leads to the colliery, and in his daily and always countless chase after the China blossoms they have seen the first trillium blossom places at the corners of the garden where the sun comes in the warmer than anywhere else."

And one of them, it was the tiny girl, said only last week "don't you think, daddy, that the spring is terribly late this year? No trilliums yet!" There was disappointment on her face, dis-appointment softened by the little-toke of the purple buds of the moss flowers that peeped their swollen buds of the daffodils.

But now, in western country, it is all rollicking. "Wait the first trillium bloom," it was "and evidence that the flowers have, and human beings may have, serious convictions about the promise of spring. There is something in this world—not the kind that the middle class thinks that nature can't give to us."

Since the first trillium has bloomed, the first red, juicy strawberry. Thus drifts that legend to hold everything that lives in their joy and is going to have substance and successors in the distant, cold of blossoms.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Mar. 22 (UP)—The board of governors of the chamber of commerce have offered the Provo chamber their support in sponsoring the Deer Creek reclamation project at the Utah water conservancy commission hearing March 27. It was announced today.

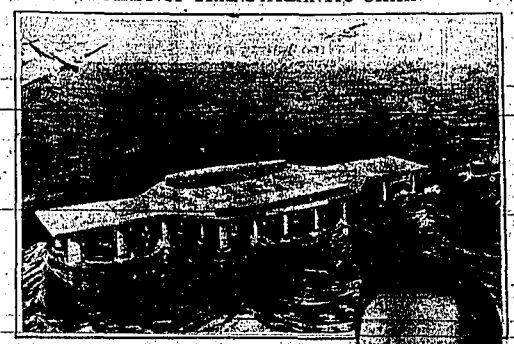

### FLOATING SEADROME ON BERMDUA AIRLINE WILL BE FIRST-OF-TRANS-ATLANTIC CHAIN



Soon, if you're sufficiently "air-minded," you can fly the Atlantic ocean in short hops. The first of a series of trans-Atlantic "floating airports" will be built immediately and anchored 300 miles at sea, half way between New York and Bermuda. This fantastic launching field will be manned by a crew of 45 men and will contain a machine shop, hotel and restaurant and a radio beacon to guide approaching planes. It will be a steel platform 1200 feet long—100 feet wide and normally will rise about 100 feet above the water. Chain 22, 100 feet long attached to "specialty" distress sea-chers will hold this floating island in place. Experimental flights will be made between the mainland and Bermuda this year, using the seadrome as a stopping place—accessible to land-based planes. The seadrome will be in charge of actual construction. He is president of Henry J. Glavin, Inc., of New York, the builders. If the first venture is successful, construction of a string of other floats across the Atlantic will be pushed as soon as possible. Engineers say the seadrome will slide any wave up to 150 feet in height, with practically no motion. For the steel platform will not float on the top of the sea, it will rest on buoys submerged in the ocean depths, where the water always is still. Anchored only at one end, the seadrome will bear with the wind, thus always offering its full length for the landing and take-off of planes.

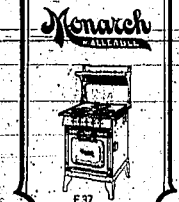
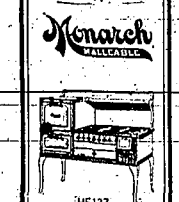

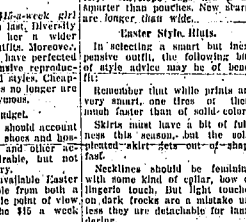

Great Deluge of Bible Fame Was Overflow of Euphrates Bay Discoverers after Trip

**ANCIENT PEOPLE HAD FLOOD WORK TO BOTHER THEM**

Great Deluge of Bible Fame Was Overflow of Euphrates Bay Discoverers after Trip

NEW YORK, March 22. (UP)—The ancient Chaldeans had their flood problems, too, according to evidence unearthed by an archaeological expedition headed by Professor G. Leonard Woolley, who said he made discoveries explaining the Biblical account of the deluge in which Noah and his ark played leading parts.

Woolley, who returned to the United States after eight years of archaeological research on the site of the ancient city of Ur, the birthplace of Abraham, on the Euphrates, said he had found evidence that Noah's flood was nothing more than a local overflow of the Euphrates river.

Excavation at Ur, which occurred sometime before 4,500 B. C., when the Sumerian civilization was at its height, after digging through an accumulation of nearly 4,000 years, and finding the remains of a highly developed and sophisticated civilization in the ancient city of Ur, excavators penetrated a layer of silt and found remains of a civilization apparently the one which, according to the Bible, was destroyed by the flood. Woolley said.

The low-lying plain of Mesopotamia was covered with a water-laid bank of clay, the archeologists said. The major portion of the population—probably—was wiped out and the survivors had to escape the new stratum imposed by the flood. Woolley said that was indicated by the fact that the earliest civilization, the Sumerian, carried out some of the traditions of their predecessors.

The Sumerians were not unlike present-day people, their women wore long dresses less than those of the present civilization. They wore "acorn-shaped" skirts, both men and women wore turbans that were high and fantastic in design and used rosaries. They were the predominant race in the region, which the Sumerians called "Sumer" and the Babylonians "Babylonia."

The Sumerian civilization flourished for about 2,000 years, from 4,500 B. C. to 2,500 B. C., when the Babylonians descended on the city of Ur and destroyed its cultured inhabitants, who were too proud to fight, Woolley said.
