ANOTHER SCHEME

A Twin Falls banker told us this one the other day:

During the past year a man has worked his way across the continent with great profit to himself. He would appear at a place of business, late Saturday afternoon, tell a story of pressing need of funds and offer to sell a watch for \$50. Questioned as to where he had purchased the watch he would reply:

"At that jewelry store right across the street. I thought it today and paid \$75 for it. Well, I've simply got to have \$50 without delay."

The man approached naturally became suspicious. In nearly every case he would call the jeweler across the street to inquire about the strange man who bought a watch. In every case the jeweler would report that he had sold a \$75 watch and that the stranger paid by check on a local bank.

The second business man would then tell the jeweler what he had found out, and the result in a majority of cases was that the stranger would be run down, questioned and then thrown into jail on an open charge, and held until Monday morning. The charge against him then would be that he had got money on a worthless check. What other inference could be drawn? A watch bought in the morning for \$75, paid for by check, and offered for sale in the late afternoon for \$50 could indicate nothing else.

usually the stranger got out of town within three or four days with from \$500 up in his pocket, and his victim kept the dead dark as midnight.

MUSCLE SHOALS AN OLD ISSUE

What you think that the question of what to do with the vast water power resources at Muscle Shoals is a problem confined to post-war years, you're sadly mistaken. It was one of the earliest problems raised in our national life.

Records of the American Philosophical Society, in Philadelphia, show that the question arose as far back as 1802. In that year, the society's minutes show the following entry:

"Donations: a plan for Muscle Shoals, Tennessee. Mr. Vaughn appointed to obtain from Sam Brown, of Lexington, some further account of it for publication."

Unfortunately, the record ends there, so there is no story of telling whether the early philosophers favored government operation of outright sale to the Henry Ford of that period.

WHAT OUR AUTOS COST

The people of the United States spend approximately \$14,000,000,000 every year on automobiles, according to figures just made public by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce. It is interesting to see how this money is spent.

The purchase of new cars takes the largest slice—\$3,830,000,000. Next comes the bill for gasoline and oil—\$2,370,000,000. Tires and spare parts cost \$2,000,000,000; chauffers and drivers are paid \$2,225,000,000; roads and streets cost \$1,600,000,000, and garage and service charges amount to \$1,015,000,000. The rest—something like \$925,000,000—goes for insurance, taxes, permits, and the like.

It's a big bill, but it's worth it. The figures, incidentally, make one wonder what would happen to our prosperity if the auto industry should vanish.

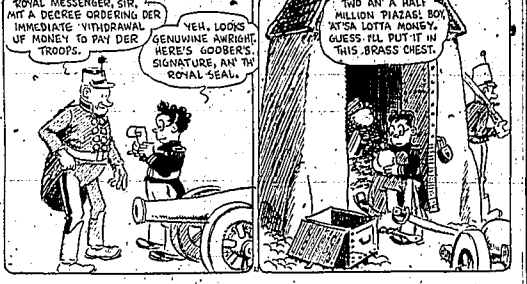
