Spain, March 25 (UP)—Francisco J. Bernal and Juan de la Cruz, who took off from Seville, Spain, in a single motorcraft last night after a long and arduous journey, were reported to have landed at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, at 10 a. m. B. T. today.

The long distance flight which the two courageous aviators sought to break, apparently still remains with the Italian, Carlo and Giuseppe, who flew from Rome to a point ten miles north of Natal, Brazil, landing July 19, 1927, after having covered a distance of 4,419 miles. It is estimated the Spanish fliers, headed by Bernal, flew 4,440 miles from Seville.

The fliers started their epochal journey from Rome, Italy, in a plane in 1928 and a grueling race, which they completed shortly after the flight to Natal.

The annual flight schedule from Rome to Natal is normally 10,000 miles, but the flight to the goal which they had sought to achieve, Rio de Janeiro, was reported to be ideal.

AMERICAN GIRL WILL HOP WITH FREIGHT PLANE

Miss Mildred Johnson Plans to Cross the Atlantic with the First Commercial Shipment

NEW YORK—The first payment of freight to be brought from Europe by air will start from Germany in May in charge of a crew of five, whom one will be an American. Mildred Johnson of Philadelphia.

"It's no stunt at all," she explained. "I'm almost perfectly safe. I've flown over in a Lockheed biplane, which is really a flying ship. In fact, if it were forced down in the sea, it could float the ship as an air-propelled yacht and be adequate in average land weather."

Miss Johnson, in the few years she has been flying, has covered some 50,000 miles in the air, of which about half in this country and half in Europe.

In the employ of the American Air Transport Association, two years ago, she inspected all the mail routes, consuming 200 hours and covering a period of 20 days, with 45 different planes and pilots.

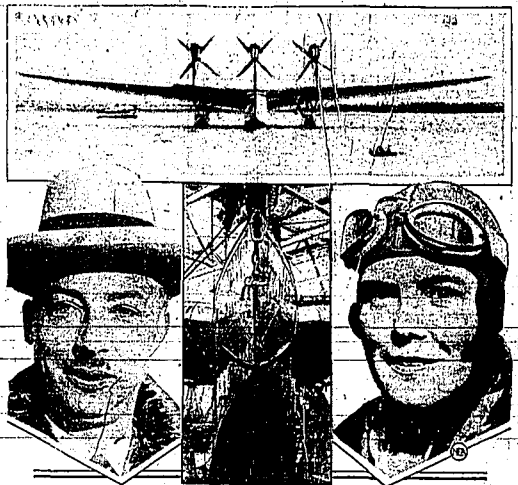
Then she went to Europe and flew over all the airways of Europe. She is convinced that the development of a cargo service between this country, Europe and South America is "much more important than a passenger service."

"Altogether has been very wise," she said, "in developing its mail service and perfecting that before attempting to make air travel popular in itself."

The Johnson is an eleven ton ship capable of carrying a five and one-half ton cargo exclusive of the crew, with a cruising speed of from 115 to 125 miles an hour. It will fly from Germany to Cape York, then to the West Indies, and then to New York, with two stopovers.

The commercial possibilities of these flying boats, and to deliver the plane to this country, she says, is taken on an exclusive basis, but one shipment of one kind, for but one important site or manufacturing plant in any one city. The rate

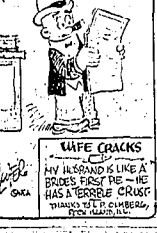

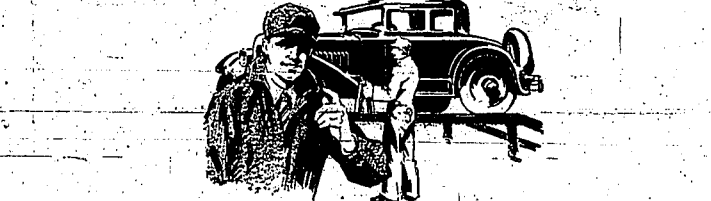

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 (AP)—
Stocks slight today, total
