

Proud Race of MANCHUS GOING

Intermediate Rapidly Wiping Out the Peoples Who Long Ruled the Chinese Country.

CEPING, March 28 (UPI)—The proud race of Manchus, who ruled the two countries for a vanishing race, and are likely to disappear almost altogether within the next two or three decades, is the opinion of Dr. James Lynn, Chinese professor of law at Chao-yang University there, who has made a study of the Manchus for years.

Dr. Lynn, who is a member of our Jewish colony in that province, Dr. Lynn believes, which managed to maintain a distinct existence for 400 years, but originally was overthrown, being absorbed by the Chinese.

At the present time, Dr. Lynn estimates, the Manchus in Peking number about 10,000, forming

one-tenth of the population. As long as their emperors ruled in the Forbidden City, they kept somewhat to themselves.

But since the Manchu emperors abdicated in 1911, the plight of the Manchus today shows a living by pulling weeds, a very severe occupation which causes them to do early, hard labor and domestic servants working for Chinese or foreigners. A large group is connected with the Chinese, of whom the Manchus

say they are fond.

But if the Manchus are treated rather badly by the Chinese today, they are merely resuming the same position which they occupied 300 years ago.

points out. When the Manchus conquered China in 1644, and set up their emperors on the Dragon Throne, Dr. Lynn declares the Manchus were an arrogant, contemptuous tribe that humbled Chinese with undue severity. The Manchu henchmen, or soldiers, were an unscrupulous lot, he says, and the Chinese that the Manchu Emperors tried to divert their attention by persuading them to train birds and roost in their direction, still common among the Manchus.

The Manchus are a very ancient race, Dr. Lynn points out. They first appear in history in 1115, and again in 1234 C. E., when their next tribute to the Chinese Empire.

They were vicious, but always very independent, becoming weaker as the Chinese weakened, until they conquered Peking in 1644.

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LEGISLATORS OF IDAHO SAVE TAX

**Approximately \$563,000 Was
Kept In Coffers by Denying
of Bills—Says J. L. Hodgin**

A brief review of some of the things done by the legislature in its recent session along with some of the things it refused to do was given yesterday by Representative J. L. Hodgin, member of the Kiwanis club. He was introduced by Junius Silton, chairman of the program committee.

The legislature, Session 1925, sat to the 31st. Mr. Hodgin stated, "\$200,000 is the ad valorem tax and \$100,000 on real estate that were defeated. Passages made in taxing units were given no power to increase the taxes with a reduction of taxes having to do with the same." The legislation was not popular with business.

Constitutive legislation included payment of \$100,000 which will permit the purchase of a pendency farm where first offenders may be segregated and kept from the general population. The reforms, said Mr. Hodgin, not anti-the-act, providing for protection were also of vital importance. State institutions were well-provided for though they did not receive all they sought. The state got results.

RAILROAD SERVES WOMEN

Twin Falls, Idaho, March 25—This town has the best railroad in the country, and the legislature, shortest, oldest and most obliging railroad in the country. The railroad is the Twin & Northern, with 11 miles of track, four cars, and a personnel of one. E. V. Stupper, who combines in his town person the station master, switchman, engine-driver, conductor and most of the time engineer and fireman.

It was 10 years ago that the railroad was built through Twin Falls, and the town of Malvern. For a long time it prospered hugely; then came hard surfaced roads, automobiles, motor buses and trucks, and it almost went out of business.

Mr. Stupper received it. He built his own car, initiated the people, provided with the most obliging trainman in town's history.

Housewives along the right-of-way still stop the train and entrust Stupper with the task of buying a pound of butter, a dozen eggs or a couple of pounds of flour. If there is a passenger in Malvern who misses the train, all he has to do is phone Twin Falls, where the train comes in, and it will have to go to Malvern and get him. Often Stupper has to get out of bed at night to call the town of Malvern to tell them to stop the train, pick up the housewife, and so on.

When you embark here for a trip on this line, Stupper is the station agent and you just step on board, and he goes out and helps you aboard. Then he mounts to the cab and guides the train to its destination.

It is not always so simple, however, things are a bit more complicated. The state is engaged in a huge road building program, and much of the material has come in over Stupper's railroad, which connects with Malvern, which connects with the Burlington, to help hand loads of cement and materials down the line. In fact, in this very spirit of prosperity may kill the rail-

MASTER FORGER ESCAPES PRISON

Walks Out of Leavenworth by Forging Writ of habeas Corpus; Is Later Arrested Again

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, Mar. 28.—(UPI)—A masterfully graduate-forged his way out of prison with a writ of habeas corpus and three court orders and then was returned for trial, but he escaped again after 20 cents was revealed here.

Hayes Vangorder, Master forger, walked out of Leavenworth for good on Feb. 10, 1928, and when prison officials reopened the forged documents—on Vangorder and another man—in the jail. The other man was C. Von Eick, who absconded from St. Paul.

Although Vangorder denied having forged the leases, corpus Christi officials were able to trace him to Vangorder's home in his escape.

Gags Released

Vangorder had been released on the writ of habeas corpus in Sept. 1928, so he could go to Capo Girardeau, Mo., to stand trial on

charges of robbing a post office, two mail boxes certified to him, and changing the case number of one from 79 to 172 and the date on the copy from Feb. 8, 1929 to Feb. 25, 1928.

With a blank letterhead that had the government watermark, Vangorder wrote a letter purporting to be from Fred H. Fitzpatrick, attorney for the state, certifying that copies were duplicates of those on file in the federal district court.

The copies of the court orders, two of the S. 3 Circuit Court of Appeals, purporting to be orders reversing Vangorder's convictions and sentences totalling 25 years. These three are believed to have been forged by Vangorder while he was in prison.

It is believed the copies were placed in the prison walls by friends outside the prison walls, who were members of the University of Minnesota fraternity, and he had, he said, a wife, a daughter and son living in Minneapolis and two sons in Cleveland.
