**LANZA BRYANT IS FOUND GUILTY OF KILLING IDAHOAN**

Recommendation of Life in Prison Is Verdict of Jury On Case

**'HIP' DICKERSON WAS ASSISTANT GRID COACH**

Defense Fought On Argument That Bryant Slashed To Protect the Girl

**CORVALIS, Ore., March 29 (UPI)—**A life term in prison faced the defendant, John L. Bryant, former footballer, his conviction just before midnight, of the first degree murder of Lewis M. Ladd, 22, sophomore at the former Oregon State college football star and assistant grid coach.

The jury returned its verdict, recommendation life imprisonment after six hours' deliberation. The recommendation makes the life sentence automatic and it will be passed by Justice Skarpenev Monday.

Bomb Is Quilted

The defendant took the verdict and after a brief silence removed from his bosom with a handkerchief and, although the court room was filled with college students, burst into uncontrollable sobs of agony.

Dickerson, one of the most popular students at the college, was stabbed by Bryant with a bread knife at 11:50 p.m. Saturday, March 17, 1928, while he was escorting Miss Ma. Troxal, pretty Corvallis blonde, and Bryant's girlfriend, Diane, to a dance.

Fight for Girl

Defense attorneys and supporters claimed that Dickerson had started a fight with Bryant over Diane in self defense—after the huge tackle had overpowered him; but the state, corroborated by testimony of the seven other students who attended the trial constantly for the past four days,

Bryant's attorney had admitted that he had no more than a right to a new trial or an appeal.

## SOME GOOD WORK

**T**HE Twin Falls post of the American Legion has been doing some work during the past few months that is bound to react to the benefit of this community, and because of the public import of its activities the organization is entitled to credit.

The Legion wants a War Memorial building for Twin Falls. Because of the experience of its members in armed service of our country it is natural that the Legion should be an advocate of such a building. The method of financing such a structure has been subject of much debate. The post has adopted the practice of sponsoring entertainments of different sorts, the profits from which are accumulating to serve as the initial fund for the building.

Several thousand dollars are already in the hands of the organization, or available, for the work. More is being added as rapidly as possible. The idea of the Legion has been to get its money piecemeal instead of in straight contributions; and the method is proving successful.

A War Memorial building will be an asset to the community. It will provide a meeting place for patriotic organizations, and a part of the space will be available for the national guard company, now without a permanent home. Such a structure will also embody and express the appreciation of the community for the war time service of its whole citizenry, armed and civilian.

The objects of the Legion are commendable, and the response on the part of the public gratifying to the group of men who have sacrificed their own personal interests in spending their time and energy in doing the work necessary to be done to make the dream come true.

## A TEST OF CURIOSITY

CURIOSITY is, and always has been, one of the strongest of human traits.

Not long ago, Harpers published a mystery novel in which the final chapter containing the solution was sealed, and offered to refund the purchase price to any buyer who, having read that far, could throttle his curiosity and return the book with the seal unbroken.

Acute curiosity, say the psychologists, is a sign of intelligence. By that gauge

we must be remarkably intelligent people. And Harpers, incidentally, must be fairly shrewd in their reading of the public mind.

**CAPTAIN FRIED'S HOBBY**  
THERE is an old theory that, you can get a pretty accurate picture of a man by finding out what his hobby is. That, the theory says, will tell you what the real man is like better than his performances in public.

It may be so, but we're beginning to doubt it. For Gilbert Swan, in his New York column, reveals that Capt. George Fried of the liner *America* has the most prosaic hobby of all—he collects postage stamps.

Somehow that doesn't fit the captain at all. It bespeaks a stay-at-home; a man unfitted for desperate chances and howling gales. It simply isn't in character. We have a hunch that a better picture of the real captain is the one most of us already have—the picture of him bringing his ship, with consummate skill and bravery, up beside another to save men's lives in a raging storm.

**FEARS FOR LINDY'S LIFE**  
**M**R. HOOVER hopes that Col. Lindbergh will give up flying and stay on the ground, where things are relatively safe, and Mr. Ford agrees with him. Both men feel that Lindbergh is too valuable to the country to risk his life any more.

We sympathize with this point of view, but we have a feeling that these two well-wishers are going to be disappointed. Somehow we can't picture the famous young flyer giving up his wings. Flying seems to be second nature with him. He couldn't stop if he wanted to.

And, as far as danger is concerned, there is this to say: Lindy has done flying that is as perilous as can be imagined, and no accident has ever befallen him. It ought to be obvious by now that he has something like a charmed life.

## Best Editorial of the Day

## BETTER COWS

(Editorial, *Standard*)  
People in the dairy industry, which has developed

into one of Idaho's most substantial economic supports, are not to be measured by volume production—but rather by average production per cow. Last year, the average production per cow in the herd of 40 cows may produce more butterfat than a herd of 10, yet the owner of the 40 cows here may lose money while the 10 cows of the smaller herd and substantially lower production per cow in the average dairy cow does not vary greatly. Therefore it becomes evident that the greater the individual production the greater the profit on that particular cow.

It is the job of herdsman to determine the quality of his cows are showing profits and which are on the profit line. And the question is important, for the profits come not only economic value in like kind, but also a more profitable entire herd. The practical method of getting out the unremunerative cows is to put an individual check on the herd over a period of time.

In doing this, the first step is to have a cow-testing organization.

For many years now, the dairy industry has conducted a "grading" campaign that has resulted in most of the non-profitable cows going to the butcher. With this question partially solved, another question arises: Can the same methods be made more economical? Can we not key the key to still greater profits in the dairy industry?

The answer is easy—by producing better cows.

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Becomes Chief of Tribe as Father Dies

May Drop Charge Against Captain of the Rum Runner

New U.S. Judge

NEW ORLEANS, La., March 29 (UPI)—The New Orleans Tribune said today it had learned that the man arrested in connection with the capture of the rum runner, the "Lorraine," was a crew member and seven members of the crew of the sunken ship "Alma" would be dropped.

The government's only evidence that Capt. Charles E. Rumford and his crew engaged in a conspiracy to violate the prohibition and customs laws is the statement of Capt. Rumford that he was not present during the transhipping of rum. Higher courts have held that the "Lorraine" sank in small boats off the coast of Louisiana. The high authorities in Washington have agreed.

"Captain Rumford's statement," the Tribune authority was quoted as saying, "is not enough to sustain the charge of conspiracy and it is therefore impossible, in my opinion, to sustain it."

Attala County Attorney Edmund F. Palmer, who has been pursuing the charges could not be reached for statement early this afternoon.
