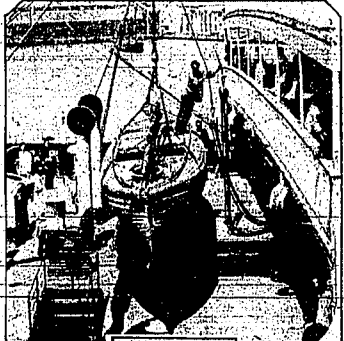

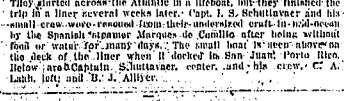

The bout will be in a rather strenuous evening of conditioning exercises, Travis has a long run to connect his nose while sparring with Nelson and Woolley.

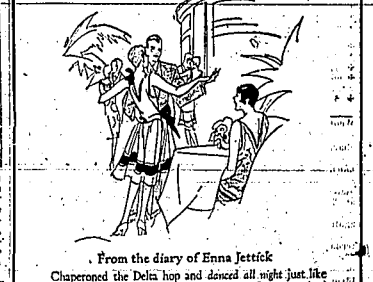
Heretofore, Woolley has had to confine his blows to the midsction when going with Travis and now they can mix it freely.

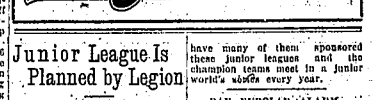
