THOSE "GOOD OLD DAYS"
 BY HUBERT CATTON

In the early days of America the sturdy frontiersman had a way of being wild, rude and lawless upon occasion, simply to prove that the vaunted democracy of his country was an absolute fact.

Restrictions irked him. His local laws were few, and he broke them with a grand gesture. Freedom was the word, and the frontiersman was punctilious about even its pettiest forms.

The modern descendant of the pioneer, in 1929, does things differently. From morning to evening he is swathed with a network of rules and regulations. If he goes riding he must observe a dizzying multiplicity of laws. If he builds a house it must conform to another set of laws. If sickness comes to his family the local government can say whether or not he can leave the house. He may not even own a gun without a permit. If he has a party, in the evening, he must see that the proceedings are relatively restrained; otherwise the neighbors are apt to send the police.

This doesn't bother the modern man very much. He's used to it. But the old frontiersman, if he could see it, would conclude that the world had gone to the dogs.

Indeed, judging from current literature, a good many people feel that way. Magazines and books are full of doleful cries. The freemen American, it seems, has forfeited his birthright and has accepted slavery. He cannot call his soul his own.

Sir William Joynton-Evels, home secretary for Great Britain, made a remark the other day that bears on this situation: "Discussing the restrictive legislation which he, as home secretary, is obliged to enforce, he said: "I say quite frankly that you have got to realize that the old days of the right of every man to do as he likes with his own area of land of the 18th and 19th centuries and will not work in the 20th."

That statement expresses the situation admirably. It represents a condition we must recognize. We may not like it, but we must accept it. We are the descendants of the frontiersmen, true enough, and we live in the same part of the globe that they lived in, but our world is as different from theirs as ancient Rome. The standards and customs they used simply will stop thinking about them.

An utterly new kind of society has been brought forth in the last half century, entirely unlike anything the world ever saw before. Modern machinery, modern methods of transportation, modern forms of communication, have given every man an infinitely greater number of next-door neighbors than his ancestors had. Year by year the necessity for co-operation grows greater; year by year it becomes increasingly evident that no man can live for himself alone.

This may be very fine or it may be too bad; worrying about it won't help much. The main thing is to admit that the change has come, that the old days are gone forever; that the old standards are eternally out of date.

BOXING SHEEP

A PLAN has been launched by the Northern Pacific railway for the purchase of 25,000 head of ewes to be placed on farms in North Dakota and Minnesota. The purchase, according to a United Press dispatch, is being made by the railway company in co-operation with the agricultural credit corporation and the agricultural colleges of the two states.

The popularity of sheep in Idaho is constantly on the increase. Farmers in this part of Idaho look with favor on the small flock as one of the surest sources of income for the amount of investment. Two sources of income are provided by the small farm flock; wool and lambs. If the flock happens to be purebred, the lambs will command a higher price because they are available as breeding stock. A great majority of Idaho farmers prefer to sell wool and mutton lambs and leave the intricacies of purebred breeding to specialists in that work.

The farm flock finds its living several months during the year on feed that otherwise would stifle an excellent chance of being wasted, and if the flock is small, the actual cash-outfit necessary in its behalf is relatively very small. In other words, a small farm flock makes it possible for the farmer to utilize some feed that otherwise would be wasted into profit. To do it, of course, some added expense must be incurred. We never get something for nothing, but the farm flock when it is small in size comes as near doing this as any form of investment that farmers can make.

Minnesota and North Dakota farmers are making a logical step in establishing farm flocks of sheep. Idaho has pointed the way.
