Master Missing and Sallors Half Starving When Ship is Located by Coast-Guardsmen

PHILADELPHIA, April 5 (UP)—Her master missing and her crew and two sailors held for hearing before a United States commissioner, the mystery schooner, Nomad, put into port here today, a crippled ship with a mysterious voyage ended.

Her owner, John D. Ross, New York and Jersey city society man, said Capt. J. H. Schell, New York, had been washed overboard by huge waves while he was in the mast.

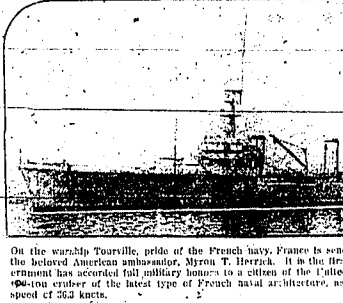
Despite all attempts by French and Schell to repair the machinery, but would not run again on her own power. The master, French, died on the boat without a life preserver.

IDAHO FARMERS PLAN ADEAGRES. FOR 1929 CROPS

Increase in Sugar Beet Plantings Seen in Reports; Warm Growers of Bean Increase

Idaho farmers evidently intend to increase the acreage of sugar crops which made them some money last season, and reduce potatoes which showed up in the red last year. This information was furnished by over 700 farmers who reported the increase last year and the acreage they intend to plant this spring.

The feed grains, corn, oats, barley and rye probably will go in on a larger acreage than last year. The intended increase in acreage is as follows: corn, 30 per cent; oats, 16 per cent; barley 25 per cent and rye 10 per cent.

Spring wheat acreage may be reduced 10 per cent, which means it will be back to about normal. Considerable spring wheat was planted in the spring of 1928 because of the difficulty in planting winter wheat at the fall of 1927.

Larger Sugar Beet Acreage
It is gratifying to note the proposed substantial increase in sugar beet acreage of 25 per cent over 1928. Some very excellent yields were secured in eastern counties last year, and with available information as to how to increase such high yields, there is no reason why Idaho should not lead all states in 1929 yields as she did in 1927.

Warning to Bean Growers
The indications indicate a possible increase of 60 per cent in Idaho bean acreage. This would be equivalent to 120,000 acres. No one knows how the season will turn out, but the yield this year equals the past five years average of 10 bushels per acre, a projection of 2,400,000 bushels would result. This would exceed the previous highest production (1927) by 754,000 bushels. States competing with Idaho are planning to increase their acreage 25 per cent to 40 per cent.

Idaho growers have steadily increased their potato acreage the past five years. In 1924 it was 65,000 acres and in 1928 116,000 acres were harvested. The proposed decrease of 25 per cent indicates 87,000 acres for 1929. This season may do better or worse than 1928, but if it equals the average for the past five years, a yield of 135 bushels per acre can be expected. This would produce 16,165,000 bushels, or about the same as 1926 of 16,195,000 bushels, which was the largest crop produced up to that year.

The prices received by Idaho are traded largely on the basis of the United States potato crop as shown by the following table. Note the price when production is over 400
