**COMING EVENTS**

April 8-9-10—Annual meeting of the Central Idaho district association of the Industrial clubs at Gooding. April 9—Girl scouts will have their membership committee meeting and luncheon at the Rogers hotel.

After July 1st, all school districts will be observed in 37 rural school districts in Twin Falls county, on Friday, April 19, according to a proclamation issued by the state superintendent of schools. Mrs. C. M. Wilson has sent copies of suggested programs for the day at all the schools in the state. All the days, however, will be observed from the first Saturday in April to the last Saturday in June.

After July 1st, all school districts will be observed in practically every state in the Union. The first to pass a regular school day for the purpose was the Clark county superintendent; the late J. Sterling Morton, who in 1872 succeeded in doing Nebraska, had native and adopted sons in the public schools a day for the purpose. Great enthusiasm was aroused and over a million trees were planted. The date depends on the climate of different sections and is absolutely fixed in but few.
