SEALS CLAMBER OUT OF CELLAR

Defeat League Leaders and Hollywood Team is Placed in Last Position by Loss

The San Francisco Seals were out of the cellar today by virtue of a 9 to 3 win yesterday over Sacramento, but the Senators still topped the Pacific Coast league by four points in the percentage column. The Seals may be chalked up to pitcher Johnny Fournier, who blanked the visitors after a half first inning in which he had 10 hits, and then won his own ball game with a single in the second that brought in a run and a homer in the sixth that brought in two runs.

Oakland scrambled into a tie for second place with Los Angeles by a 6 to 3 victory over the Angels, but their home slumped. The Oaks made 15 hits to 5 for the home team and made the season with five runs in the first two innings.

Portland, playing at home, kicked the Hollywood Stars into the cellar with a 4 to 3 victory achieved in a fast ninth inning rally that started from a Hollywood error.

Seattle slid out of the cellar, with a 5 to 4 win over the Mission Reds, largely accomplished by the activities of Eric Johnson, new manager of the Indians, who was his double in the eighth and drove home the winning run.

Wild Morning Glory One of Most Noxious Of Various Varieties

Motto's note—This is the first of a series of articles on noxious weeds prepared by Ralph Bristol, agricultural agent of Blaine county, and accepted by the Board of Trustees of the Twin Falls county weed committee. Each article will deal with a noxious weed and methods of control. The articles will appear in the Evening Times on Wednesdays.

Wild Morning Glory is probably the most prevalent and destructive of the noxious weeds, either native to the United States or introduced here. It has been completely exterminated by the root-killing growth of the plant. It is very difficult to control for the reason that it is practically useless for crop production and owing to the danger of further spreading it would offer the better if the fields were not cropped.

For field bladders or Wild Morning Glory, as described in Extension Bulletin No. 65 of the University of Idaho, as an introduced species. It is a native of the British Isles and is a very hardy plant. It is a very fast-growing plant and its leaves are much like those of the morning glory.

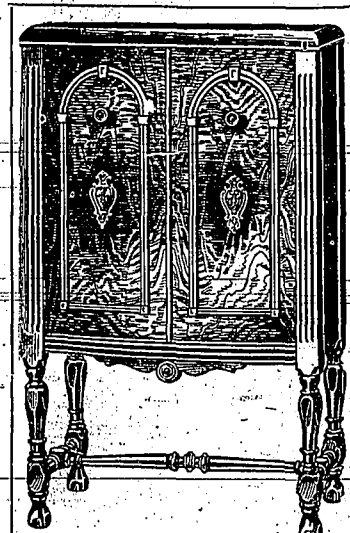

The work of the Idaho Bureau of Child Hygiene during the past year reached approximately 3,000 infants and preschool children and nearly 500 prospective mothers.

Since Idaho's acceptance of the provisions of the Sheppard-Towner act in 1921, maternity and infant care work has been carried on in all counties of this state. Each week was carried on in 21 counties during the year reported on the maternity and infant act will expire June 30, 1929.

Figures from the Idaho Bureau of Child Hygiene during the year included the state medical society, State tuberculosis association, federal women's club, American Red Cross, the Portland health council, and the joint-teacher council.

Kiddies' Pennies Provide Flowers

CASTLEFORD, April 10 (Special)—The children of the public school have furnished the money for providing flowers for sick people this winter.

During the past winter the local R. T. A. has sent flowers to sick people and to several ill persons. The necessary funds for such a purpose has been furnished by the children through the "Pennies for Pennies" fund.

All money raised from the penny march is used for sick people and the year to fund all of the flowers necessary. The children have been enthusiastic about the penny march which occurred at the city hall every second monthly meeting by nurses, who gave instruction to the children for the first time in 1927—the number dropped to 55.

A survey of 51 hospitals was a special feature of Idaho's maternity and infant work in the year covered by the report. State-wide surveys also were made of midwives and crippled children. Statistical studies were made of the causes of infant and maternal deaths in the different counties of the state.

Other accomplishments during the year included the conducting of physicians of 23 child-health conferences at which nearly 1,500 patients and preschool children were examined; 800 home visits by nurses, who gave instruction to the mothers; and the preparation of a special report to the state.

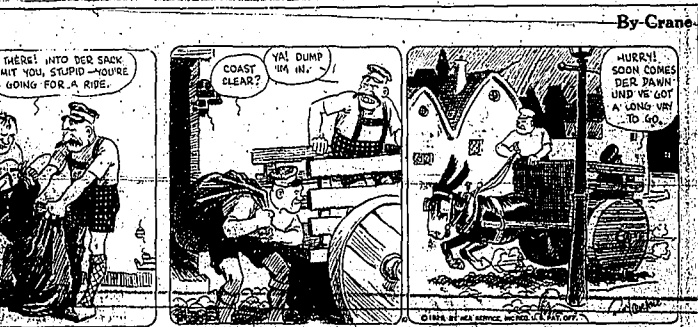
