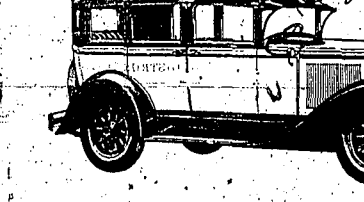

IN BEHALF OF THOSE NOT IMPLICATED

TWIN FALLS has been subjected to shock during the past few days by reason of the uncovering of a series of alleged burglaries of houses by a group of young men and the arraignment in court of those of the defendants who have been apprehended. Shock sometimes induces hysteria that results in wholly unjustifiable actions on the part of the public, or individuals, and because of that fact this statement is offered.

At the time the first publicity was given the case in the Evening Times no formal complaints had been brought. The statements of the officers to the effect that approximately 20 young men between the ages of 16 and 20 had been involved by revelations made by the boys "themselves" as definite information as could be secured. The confessions, according to the officers, was that only intoxicants were stolen. The public immediately displayed its interest, and it was only natural that imagination and false reports supplied details that were not true.

Such a situation is deplorable, and it would have been grossly unfair from this newspaper's point of view and its code of journalistic ethics to publish a preliminary news story presenting the generalities of the conditions without following through with definite information when that information became a matter of public record.

The original complaints charged commission of a felony. These are no juvenile court cases in the ordinarily accepted sense. The defendants who pleaded guilty in the probate court were held to answer in district court. The information supplied by this newspaper has been secured from the complaints that are a part of the public records. Those are records as handled daily by newspaper men, and criminal and civil cases and the charges and allegations contained in them are published as a matter of obligation to the public and for its information.

This taxation, though nominally only one-quarter as heavy as that paid on private residences and business, has nevertheless proved a serious burden to the farmer, since it has been levied, not upon his profits, but on the value of the ground. The other measure provides that the farmer's right to sell his land in small lots shall be protected. The government has agreed to relieve farmers of the burden of the local taxation which these new laws have hitherto paid, conditionally upon the saving that made being given back to the producer. This measure is now being carried through the legislature. It is hoped that it will be passed before the session of the legislature in 1921.

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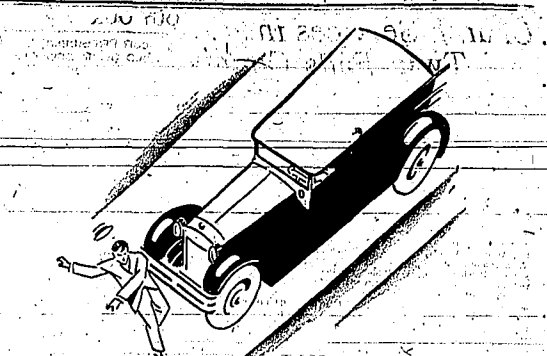
