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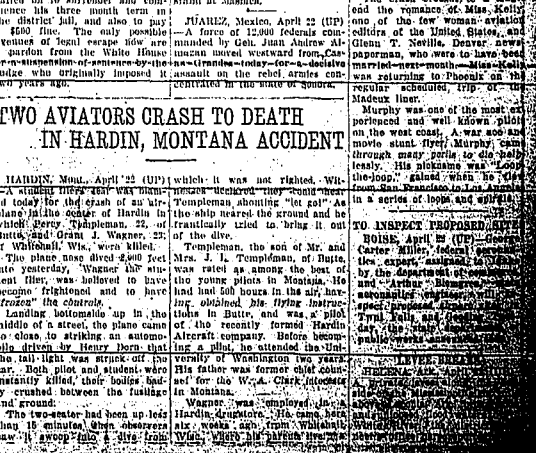
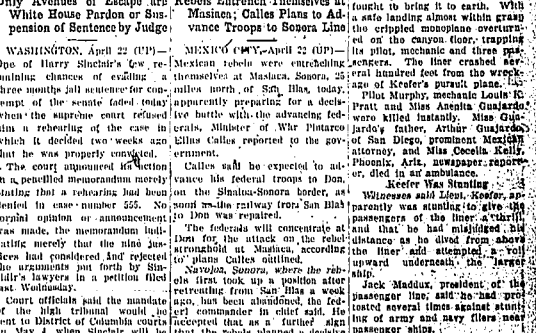

POOR BASEBALL MARKS OPENING LEAGUE GAMES

Brooklyn Club has Lost Five Games in a Row Many Boneheads Puled in Games

NEW YORK, April 22 (U.P.)—Many postponements, a few surprises and a number of unusual events have marked the first week of the major league season.

The Boston Braves and the New York Giants are tied for the lead in the National League without a tie game. The Philadelphia Athletics are first place in the American League with three victories and one defeat.

Sixteen games have been postponed in the first six days of the season, nine in the National League and seven in the American.

Had baseball had its usual season, it would have opened in many games, especially in the national league, where the Philadelphia Phillies, Pirates, Reds and even the Giants have the full run—helped, first, by heavy rain in the city.

The Brooklyn club, beset with injuries and hard luck, has dropped five games in a row. Even Val Pichler, the holder of new contract, acquired from the Pirates in a trade, allowed a ball to roll between his legs Sunday, permitting the Philadelphia Phillies to score one of their four runs which helped lead Brooklyn.

Price fighters of Twin Falls are now busy at the American Legion, but afternoon and evening training for the big and last fight card to be staged here April 16 at Pleasure Hill by the American Legion. The boys have been working out diligently for the past week and expect to continue their intensive training the early part of this week, meeting off for the big bout.

Alvin Lewis, the Portacello street boy, is working but at Pleasure Hill for his debut in Twin Falls and his chance at the heavyweight title of Idaho. Lewis has worked for himself a reputation at Pleasure Hill and has been a headliner several times in Salt Lake City, where he led a commendable career in his fighting.

Alvin works out at Pleasure Hill in defense of his title claim and expects to be in excellent condition. He was practically untroubled in his last bout, one with Adrian Elliot at Pleasant, Utah, and should have no trouble being in his best fighting trim.

RADIO TO ASSIST AVIATORS AT NIGHT

Planes Equipped With Communication Apparatus to Help Aviators in Bad Storms

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 22 (U.P.)—When night flying is inaugurated on the Gooding Transport company and Western Air Express lines May 1, there will be greatly assisted by the radio and aviators flying blindly into rough and stormy weather.

The companies are now equipping their planes with the latest approved models of radiophones, which will be in constant communication with land stations at regular intervals. One set being installed on the Western Air will permit both ground-to-plane and plane-to-ground conversation, operators certified. Other will use the international code and permit ground to plane communication only.

Both companies report they will be ready for the double service schedule which is under effect May 1. In addition to the tri-annual round trips now being used by the Western Air Express, all-night flights of high speed will be added.

Business Shows Upward Trend in Utah for March

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 22 (U.P.)—Business conditions in Utah during the month of March, a business index survey by O. H. Harlow, technical statistician, states.

Market prices averaged 41.4 per cent higher than those paid during the same month a year ago, and prices paid farmers for their products were estimated at 12.8 per cent higher.

Range conditions are about the same, the report said, but the outlook is less favorable than a year ago. Stockyards receipts in March were 10.8 per cent higher than in February but 21.6 per cent below those of March, 1923.

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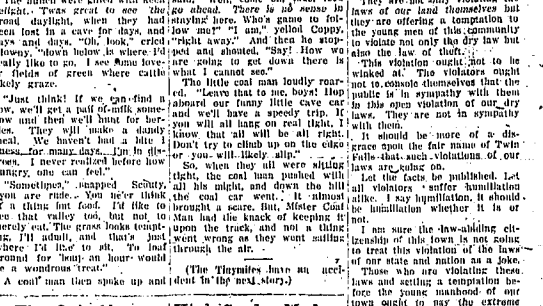
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Public Forum. Some recent regulations. To the Editor: I am surprised when we read in the daily press of raids being made in some of our large cities for violations of our dry laws.

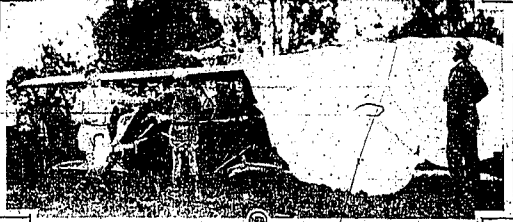
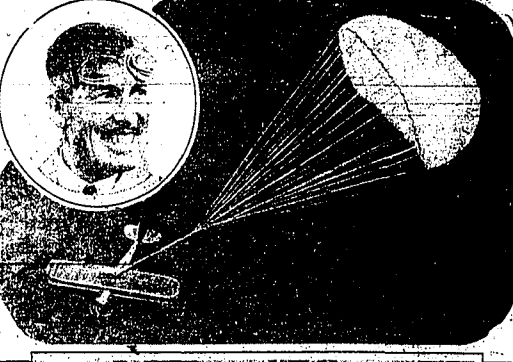
