TEXAS CYCLONE LEAVES TRAIL OF DESOLATION

Buildings in Town of Slocum, Population 300, Are Completely Ruined by Twister

PALESTINE, Tex., April 25 (UP)—The town of Slocum, 100 miles south of here, lay in ruins today, every building and structure leveled by a cyclone which struck from the south, respecting after a brief, but devastating, stay.

Seven bodies have been recovered from the wreckage of homes, stores and a school house. Several persons still were missing, and it was possible the number of dead might reach 10.

The known dead: Mrs. and Max P. McMichael, Mrs. Ben Kirkwood and two sons, Mrs. Clara Miller, Mrs. Bull Galtin.

Among the critically injured in Palestine, Palestine were Thomas J. Galtin, crippled principal of Slocum village schools. It was Galtin's cool-headedness and heroism which probably saved the lives of many of the 120 people who were trapped in two school buildings.

CHICAGO, April 25 (UP)—A man with a double life, who lived as a respectable dentist by day and as a gangster by night, was murdered in his Chicago office today.

Dr. Brady, who police charged admitted credit for his double life, was shot in the back of the head by a man with a double life.

With two hours after the murder, police officers claimed they had uncovered an amazing story of the dual life of a reputable dentist who, for years, had been a member of a gang.

common citizen to appreciate just what officers are up against.

The obstacles that remain to be overcome in enforcement of laws in which search and seizure figure are such that the use of stoof pigeons seems about the only method that promises to get results, the prosecuting attorney stated.

The enforcement of liquor laws is relatively much more difficult in Idaho than in a majority of the other states in the United States, the speaker informed his audience. The differences reside on laws and interpretations of laws as made by the courts.

The greatest degree of immunity that seems to be offered in this state to liquor law violators is that the source of satisfaction to an appreciable percentage of our citizens, but at the immunity from search and seizure is more pronounced in Idaho in liquor cases, a layman it would seem that it also applies to those who hide infernal machines, stolen automobiles and any number of other commodities. The situation is disquieting.

After all is said and done it appears that in the final analysis public opinion is likely to be more effective in settling the liquor question than law enforcement itself. By that statement it is not intended that the impression be created that liquor laws need not be enforced—far from it! But the part public opinion is to play in the solution of the problem becomes greater, and the responsibility of the public in giving expression to its disapproval of law breaking becomes more a necessity.

Just suppose all those things had happened within 30 days after the inauguration of Al Smith, had he been elected at the last election. Can you imagine the howl that would have gone up from the republican press?"

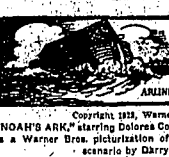
DAIRYING RECEIVES STIMULUS

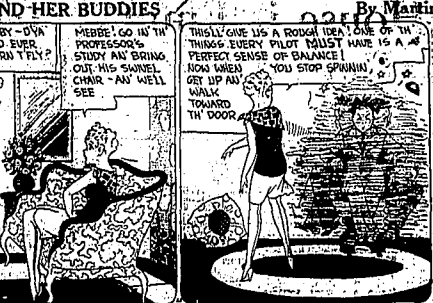
