St. Louis' Mainstay Defeats White Sox 3-2, Wins 'Aver' Age of 33 1/2 Years for Game

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Sam Gray, star right hander of the St. Louis Browns, in the first major league pitcher to win three games this season.

Gray turned in his third straight victory when he beat the Chicago White Sox yesterday, 3 to 2. He has beaten the White Sox twice and the Tigers once, allowing 21 hits and seven errors, and a record of 8 hits and 2.03 runs per game.

Six pitchers have won two straight games each. They are: Walter Hoy, Yankees; George Uhlir, Tigers; Wesley Ferrell, Indians; Burdette Brinn, Browns; Pat Malone, Cubs; and Carl Hubbell, Giants.

Tully Lyons of the White Sox got the palm for a hard luck harrier for April, having lost two hours' breaking games to the Browns. Lyons lost his first to the Browns, 4 to 1, on April 13 and again yesterday dropped a six hit game to the same club, 2 to 2. Grady Adkins of the White Sox and Earl Clark of Brooklyn are the only other pitchers who have lost two games.

Five slouts have been recorded, two of them on successive days by Guy Bush and a slout of the Chicago Cubs against the St. Louis Cardinals.

George Uhlir blanked the Browns 1 to 0. Al Thomas, who pitched a six hit game to the opener against the Browns only to lose the decision, blanked the Indians in his second game, 10 to 0. Emil Yde, the former Pittsburgh southpaw who pitched a comeback with the Tigers, shut out the Indians yesterday, 5 to 0.

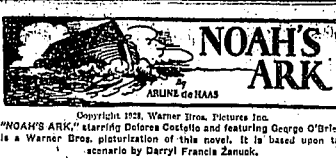

Blue Triangle Club Honors Mothers at Elaborate Banquet

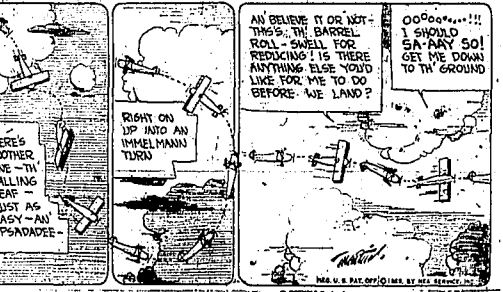
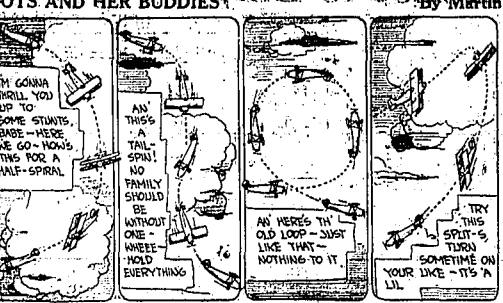
