OUR CODE OF JOURNALISTIC ETHICS
 The code of journalistic ethics of this newspaper which is presented below is followed by the news staff in gathering and writing news. Because the public has a vital interest in the rules that prevail the code is published as a matter of information. The code is as follows:
 The newspaper business is a high calling and offers great opportunities for service. Along with opportunities it also presents inescapable responsibilities which require of news writers a high measure of character to face and solve. Employees who do not feel equal to the obligations imposed by news writing owe it to themselves and this newspaper to find some other line of work.

The actual gathering and writing of news requires chiefly these qualities, accuracy, fairness and thoroughness. Go to authentic sources for news, get the facts accurately and get every angle of the facts. If there are two or more sides to a story, get them, and get them in detail, whether the story is big or little. Then in writing these facts for publication be fair.

Remember that all of the people hereabouts are our neighbors and friends. We wish to help them, not to hurt them. Our preference is to write news that brings cheer and is a record of successful achievement, but we must publish news fearlessly and impartially when the public interest demands, and our presentation of such news must not be determined by friendships.

Be extremely careful where a news story reflects on a man's good name and doubly careful when the good name of a woman is involved. Write nothing in malice or for revenge. Write no news about women or girls that will make them bear the brunt of any clownish joke. This newspaper will not tolerate an employee who uses his or her position to get revenge against any person.

As a news gatherer strive earnestly to deserve the respect and confidence of the public. Be courteous always, even in those rare times when you are treated discourteously and be considerate and studious. Treat visitors to the office with the same courtesy and consideration you would extend them if they visited you in your home. Carry out this same consideration of others in your conversations over the telephone. Strive to add constantly to your store of information about the problems of individuals and of the community. To be a sympathetic and critical listener is one of the outstanding requirements of a competent news writer.

More scandal is not newspaper material. Scandal of today may be news of record in court tomorrow. When a court record is made by reason of an arrest or the filing of complaint or suit, the record furnishes an authentic source of information.

The Evening Times INVARIABLY publishes all suits and actions, both criminal and civil, filed in district court, and criminal cases in the lower courts involving traffic offences, bootlegging, white slavery, narcotic cases, and other serious cases. Strictly juvenile cases are handled on their merits. If a suit is withdrawn or settled immediately it may be considered as not having been filed if the occasion justifies. But proof of settlement must be submitted by the interested parties to prove good faith. We do not scandalize or gossip.

Remember that all parties are on a par in court actions. Rich or poor,

powerful or humble, all should be treated fairly, and no one should receive special favors in the matter of publicity.
 It is an unpardonable sin on the Evening Times for anyone to take money or any other payment for publishing or suppressing news.
 Advertising matter should be handled by the business office. Stories of a semi-advertising nature, in other words, free publicity, should be passed on by the business office. Do not use propaganda stories in behalf of paid entertainment or other affairs without approval of the business office. Any passes or free tickets of any sort intended for employees should be handled through the business office.
 Finally, try to measure up in performance of your duties to the responsibilities your work imposes. The public depends on you and your newspaper for much information. Present it accurately, fairly, thoroughly. A newspaper reflects the details of life of its community, big and little, and forms a record of its ambitions, ideals, achievements and failures. The task is a real one. Strive always to be worthy to do the work.

ILL WIND BLOWS GOOD
 THE old saying to the effect that "it's an ill wind that blows nobody good" is being proved again in at least one of the results of the late, cold spring that has prevailed all over the country. Most of us have been quite put out by this tardiness of spring. We have even raised our voices in protest. Spring was late, but it loomed just around the corner, the optimistic claimed, but their optimism has been sorely tried.

The small compensating factor that has made itself apparent in the situation to make spring's shortcomings more easily borne is that the price of potatoes has jumped upward. Spring's lateness everywhere has delayed and reduced the movement of the early crop out of the southern district, thus providing a stimulated demand for our stored crop.

A local dealer who keeps close watch and check of the potato movement estimated that there remains in the Twin-Falls area from 200 to 225 carloads of potatoes in storage, just a residue of the big crop we produced. The tubers are being sorted for shipment as rapidly as the work can be done. Of course, the growers who sold their crop at cost, or actually lost money, are not enthusiastic about potatoes right now, but the community as a whole can indulge in a little bit of thanksgiving that the market finally lifted at this late day, finally did get some strength.

CAREFUL FEEDING AID TO DAIRYING
 University Dairy Department Advocates Judicious Use of Home Grown Feed Mixture

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 27—Economic production of dairy farms requires the judicious selection of home grown feeds in the proper mixtures and in correct ratios as production according to the dairy department of the University of Idaho College of Agriculture. The department, in disseminating suggestions for the proper feeding of dairy cattle, has been producing a feed mixture in the irrigated sections of Idaho where there is an abundance of low priced alfalfa hay calls for a different schedule than that area. When alfalfa hay is only roughage, the college of agriculture recommends one of the following mixtures: barley, three parts, and bran one part; or barley or corn, four parts, oats, one part, and bran one part; or corn and ecd meal, two parts, oats, one part, and bran, one part. Molasses may be substituted for barley pound for pound.

Silage is used when alfalfa hay is supplemented with silage, wet beet pulp, or potatoes, one of the following: one part, corn, four parts, or corn, one part, oats, one part, and bran, one part; or wheat, one part, oats, one part, and bran, one part; or barley or corn, four parts, oats, two parts, and oilseed, one part; or barley or corn, one part, and bran, one part; or one part each of barley and oats.

More milk can be produced per acre in the summer by feeding good pasture than by any other feed. As high grasses grow in the late summer it is necessary to use supplemental feeds. Alfalfa should be fed once a day during the summer and heavy producing cows should be fed with straw or hay in the pasture, the college recommends.

No Minerals Needed.
 Low producing cows probably do not need minerals unless they have deprived appetites, indicated by eating bones, dirt, etc. High producing cows, however, may

Suggested mineral feeds are given by the college of agriculture, which include 200 pounds of untreated lime or meal or spent lime black, 100 pounds of salt, 100 pounds sterilized bone-meal, 100 pounds of heavy mineral limestone, 100 pounds of magnesian limestone, and 100 pounds of salt. Mix and feed as three per cent of grain mixture. Also keep in stock the amount of all listed calcium is desirable.
