# MEXICAN REVOLUTION NEARING CLOSE

## Big Rebel Force Yields to Enemy; Insurgents Flee

Foes of Government Surrender Unconditionally; Detachment of Troops Sent in Pursuit of General Roberto Cruz, Fugitive; Calles is Congratulated

MEXICO CITY, April 28 (UP)—Information that 1000 rebels, commanded by General Francisco Borquez, had surrendered to the Mexican Federal Army in Sonora, was hailed by Government officials here today as a sign that the revolution, which began March 3 was nearing an end.

## THREE PLUNGE TO DEATH IN AIR ACCIDENT

Hollywood Youths Take Early Morning Flight After Day Party; Plane Catches Fire

LOS ANGELES, April 29 (UP)—Three young men who left early this morning for a party, were killed in a plane crash today. The plane was flying over the ocean when it caught fire and plunged to the sea.

## GIBSON PROPOSAL ON DISARMAMENT SOUNDLY SCORED

American Ambassador Said to Have Played Directly into Hands of Foreign Diplomats

CHAIRMAN FRED BRITTON ISSUES NEW STATEMENT

Head of House Naval Affairs Committee Strongly Opposes Stand Taken by Mr. Gibson

WASHINGTON, April 28 (UP)—Chairman Fred Britton of the house naval affairs committee today issued a statement soundly scoring the proposal of American Ambassador Gibson for a general disarmament conference.

"In my opinion, the rebellion in Sonora has been terminated, as the principal traitors continue their flight north alone," Calles appended to his report.

CHICAGO, April 27 (UP)—Plans for a third transcontinental air passenger service were disclosed here today in the acquisition of the Stout Air Lines, Inc. by the United Aircraft and Transport Corporation.

F. H. Hentscher, president of the United organization, announced that the Stout purchase and other immediate expansion moves, to place a new transcontinental service in competition with the Transcontinental Air Transport and the Western Air express.

The Stout lines, operating passenger service between Chicago and Detroit and other cities, will be operated as a subsidiary, Hentscher said.

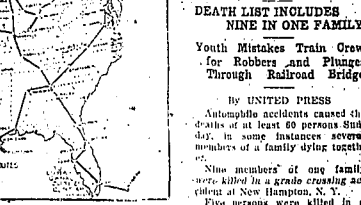

EXPLOITING A NATURAL RESOURCE

IT is fitting that Twin Falls is to be represented at the meeting in Baker, Oregon, that will be held early in May by cities on the Oregon trail. The purpose of the meeting is to devise ways and means to secure added traffic over the historic highway, to make its wonders better known and more fully appreciated by the every increasing caravan of motorists who spend a part of the year in seeing America.

We have not only the unquestioned right to feel great pride in the historic pathway, but we would be stupid indeed if we failed to avail ourselves of the advantages it offers to all the communities it lies through by means of its gray-black ribbon of modern highway. Over its smooth surface roll the newer caravan that follows in the footsteps of the emigrants of earlier days. The lure of the Northwest is far from spent. From farther east surges a constant stream of humanity intent on seeing for themselves the new Northwest and passes through our country every year.

The Oregon Trail is one of our greatest natural resources. The status of the new canal and the developments that will insure one of the best ways to add to the wealth of our northwestern states is to share the wonders and benefits of our resources with visitors. Tomorrow they may have added their means and energies and capital to our own to mutual benefit. By all means, let the world be told of our grand transcontinental highway and the wonders it unfolds. No more worth-while job faces the communities that are stretched along the course of the Oregon Trail.

WAIT A SECOND! SOME idea of what a second, or a very few seconds, mean in driving motor cars can be gained by study of a speed and safety table, which was published recently in a trade journal. Too much speed in driving is responsible for more automobile accidents than anything else, according to students of traffic, and seconds become very important. According to the safety table figures a car driven at a speed of 10 miles an hour is covering 14.67 feet per second, and the average car with two wheel brakes can be brought to a stop in nine feet. The use of four wheel brakes will make stopping possible in five feet. At 20 miles per hour the speed per-

second is 29.34 feet, and stopping distance 39 feet for two wheel brakes, or 21 feet for four wheel brakes. At 30 miles per hour a car is traveling 44 feet per second and can be brought to a stop within 87 feet or 47 feet. At 50 miles per hour the speed per second is 73.3 feet. To stop by use of two wheel brakes will require 242 feet, or by four wheel brakes, 128 feet.

When statistics are brought into play, it is easy enough to gain a new idea of the value of a second. Correct use of the second may enable one to avoid a fatal accident, and an error of judgment by the margin of a split second may result in a smash.

Seconds are not so valuable as we have been led to believe. Particularly would it be to advantage to lose a few of them in driving. Less haste and more care should be used to make the highways and streets safer.

REMORSE COMES TOO LATE THE hardest time in the world for a man to face is the disillusionment and heart-ache of those who have loved and trusted him.

Unfortunately, men usually remember such things too late. If Campbell had thought of it sooner, the "torch murder" might never have taken place.

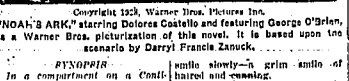
DIPLOMATS TO TACKLE REPARATIONS

The impression of hopeless deadlock in reparations negotiations is in accord with the habit of negotiators on European politics. This is partly a result of the psychological condition of Europe, partly a result of the political condition of negotiators to put the worst face on the situation. In fact the reparations negotiations have only passed their first stage and the interests involved have not yet begun to be reconciled. In the absence of an agreement, Germany must continue to pay 2,500,000 marks a year under the Dawes plan. 

But, whether salesmen are employed or not, the consistent use of good-printed matter will build any worthy business to greater possibilities.

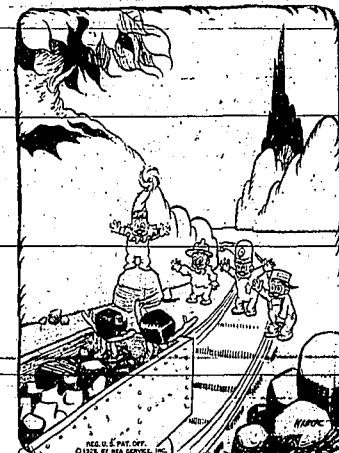
