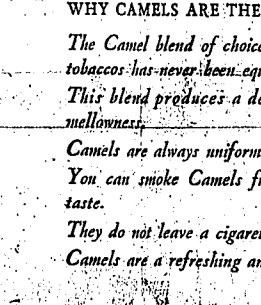

cracking of an electrical generator, rather than to the stars and the wind as we used to think, we would do well to keep that expression in regular use.

Dr. Crile's researches are extremely interesting, and there is no doubt that they add immensely to the store of human knowledge. Yet it would be a mistake to suppose that they really clear up the fundamental mystery.

Life may be a matter of electricity, as Dr. Crile suggests; and what scientist will arise now to tell us what electricity is? We have only exchanged one mystery for another.

During the last century mankind has found out a great deal about itself and about the world it inhabits. It has dispelled the old fables by which primitive men sought to interpret the puzzles of existence, and has substituted for them a series of far less interesting formulas and equations. But it is really no nearer the root of the matter than it was before.

The ancient Aztecs believed that the creator of the world made a set of clay figures, blew life into them with his nostrils, and sent them forth to inhabit the world—which, by the way, he had trampled into shape with his feet.

The modern scientist believes that man is a very complicated sort of storage battery, moving about on a speck of cosmic dust as long as his charge of electricity lasts.

Both conceptions are interesting. Neither one clears up the ancient mystery.

We tear down the old curtains of ignorance only to find an endless vista of new ones. And if this leaves room for doubt and disquiet, it also leaves room for faith and boundless hope. The technicians may have reduced you to an electrical equation, but what of that? You are still unexplainable.

**A FLIMS Y EXCUSE**

When man stands convicted of a crime, and under sentence to prison, he always makes desperate last-minute attempts to get out of it. Usually his final pleas and excuses are flimsy to the utmost degree.

Seldom, however, has a weaker plea been made than that made by Harry F. Sinclair, who is at last faced by the terrible penalty of spending three months in jail for bribing a cabinet officer and stealing a hundred million dollars' worth of oil.

Sinclair protested that if he went to jail his stockholders—many of them widows and orphans—would suffer loss. Hence, he said, the government should call it quits and revoke his sentence.

It is a long time since any argument so specious as that has been presented. One's heart must bleed for the widows and orphans—but Mr. Sinclair, after all, is getting off easy. He has no kick coming.

# Beauty Institutes in France Arouse Wrath Of Country's Doctors

Parliament Asked to Protect Beauty of French Women Against Powerful Methods

PARIS, April 29 (UP)—The French parliament has been asked by a group of doctors to protect the beauty of French women against the high-powered methods employed by the beautification industry which has become a serious complication in the cheeks of many women.

An inquiry was under way today. So serious have been the protests that the minister of health, acting upon the recommendation of the superior health council, has ordered a thorough investigation into the workings of the so-called beauty institutes.

France appears to have gone mad. On every important street corner in Paris and in provincial cities beauty "experts" have sprung up like mushrooms. The industry has grown so rapidly that the French women are so eager for beauty that soon there will be as many beauty parlors in Paris as cafes, and there are plenty of cafes.

So far there is no law against it. There is nothing in the French statutes to prevent the activities

of the beauty specialists or to enforce federal control of the industry.

Any gentleman or lady with a high sounding name and a good imagination may open shop and do a hand office business. The industry of health will endeavor to formulate a project on which the parliament can work so that the shops may be regulated.

In Florida, eminent surgeons contend that the institutes have replaced warfare. It is his contention that it is illegal practice of medicine to pluck eyebrows by machinery and urges that the authorities be empowered to place policemen inside the beauty parlors to see that the laws governing the medical profession are enforced.

"There is grave danger for the future of the race unless these institutes are curbed," Dr. Bordas said.

"Most of the mud-baths brought to France from the East and Czecho-Slovakia have no more power to render beauty than the mud dug up above the Seine banks. Real danger lies in the composition of face creams, paints and powders which are often based in zinc, mercury or arsenic sulphate."

## COUNCIL PASSES TWO ORDINANCES

Two ordinances were written, introduced and passed under suspension of the rules by the city council last evening. The first ordinance passed provided for the raising of the license fee for the retail sale of new automobiles from \$10.00 to \$15.00 and the second ordinance provides that a license for a motor car be paid by plebeians, clergymen, seers, fortune tellers, or astrologers if they come in the city for a period of a month or \$50 a month if they remain that long.

These two ordinances were presented under what was considered an emergency by the city commission. The body had already raised the fees on test shows had full but had neglected to do so. Representative of a test show, formerly the Toby Walker company, appeared seeking a license for his show opening next week. Following the lead of the mayor the council moved to increase the license fee for the pleasure of the local theaters, owners of which pay heavy taxes and contribute to the city in every possible way. The representative of the test company stated that \$50 a day would be prohibitory and prevent his show from coming here. License rates for circuses, carnivals, menageries, wild west shows and other outdoor shows were also brought to the ordinance committee. Penalty for violation was set at \$100 fine and each show without license would be considered a separate offense.

The ordinance regarding plebeians was passed to cope with the present situation in Twin Falls, two activities being in operation here now. Police officers were told of the ordinance after its passage and asked to notify the plebeians. Penalty for violation of this ordinance is \$100 fine.
