RIOTS FEATURE MAY DAY CELEBRATION

Expedition Reaches Bodies of Aviators In Australian Wilds

Tragic Fate of Keith Anderson and Robert Hitchcock Comes to Light When Searching Party Arrives at Scene of Plane Disaster; Messure Tells of Isolated Flyers' Efforts to Take-Off in Plane

SYDNEY, Australia, May 1 (AP)—The tragic fate of two Australian fliers in the wilds of the northwest was described briefly today in a message from the expedition which went overland to the spot where the plane Kookaburra was forced down. The fliers, Lieut. Keith Anderson and his mechanic, Robert Hitchcock, set out three weeks ago in search for the airplane in Southern Cross, which had been forced down in that region. Capt. Charles E. Kingsford-Smith and his companions of the Southern Cross were all saved, but Anderson and Hitchcock were not. When they came down, 80 miles from water.

SENATE REJECTS HEFLIN PLEA FOR MORAL SUPPORT

Upper House Refuses to Pass Alabama Senator's Resolution on Peaceful Assembly

WASHINGTON, May 1 (UP)—Senator Heflin lost his fight to get a formal declaration of moral support from the senate today. By a vote of 49 to 14 the senate refused to endorse Heflin's resolution proposing to place the senate on record as upholding freedom of assembly and the right of peaceful expression of opinion. The resolution, which was introduced by Heflin, proposed that the senate should take action to prevent any attempt to interfere with the American right of free assembly and the right of peaceful expression of opinion.

Wool Market Show. The demand for wool is still slow, and buyers are exhibiting only a nominal interest in the new clip according to C. E. Lewis, manager of sheep man. 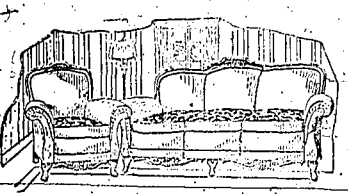

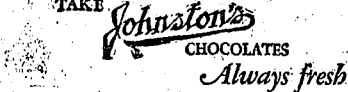

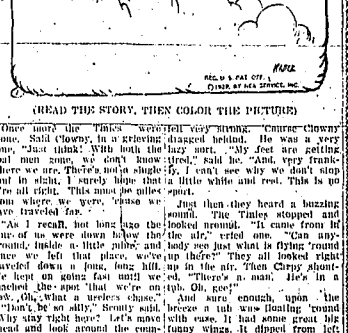
