HARTNETT'S ARM CAUSES CONCERN IN CHICAGO CAMP

Star-Cub Catcher's Arm Bores to Yield to the Treatment, Team is Going Well

CHICAGO, May 6 (UP)—Joe McCarthy's men have won four games out of five in their recent Chicago camp. The team is going well, but McCarthy's arm is a source of concern. The catcher, who is a star on the Cubs' side all last year and the players looked to their double victory over the Phillies Saturday as an omen that this is their year.

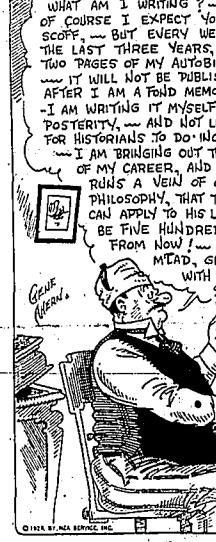

BECKY BRADLEY ROBBERY CASE AGAIN IN COURT

Husband of Convicted Woman Still Fights Legal Battle to Prevent a Term in Prison

LA GRANGE, Tex., May 6 (UP)—That Becky Bradley Rogers, convicted of bank robbery, never will go to prison is the confident declaration of Otto Rogers, her lawyer, after more than two years of successful battle in her behalf.

It also is ordered, revived here today it will be the third jury she has faced. A first jury found she was an unincapable cause of the 1927 bank robbery, as part of a plan to rob a bank there while the townspeople fought the fire. The jurors disagreed on whether she was mentally responsible and a minor criminal.

A second jury tried her here in December, 1927, for the robbery of the Farmers' National Bank of Blue Hill, Tex., on Dec. 11, 1926. They found her responsible and assessed her punishment at 11 years in prison.

The Texas court of criminal appeals found the prosecution's appeal from the jury infirm and ordered a retrial. It is the trial schedule that has been set.

Many believe the case will have to be transferred because of inability to get an unprejudiced jury in the county where the trial is conducted so much interest here.

Removal of Booth.

In case of removal the location of a new trial is doubtful. The case was transferred from Hayes county, where the bank was situated because of local feeling. In Williamson county the arena is held in the city. In Travis county, the case is even more discussed for Becky Bradley was a treated employe of Gov. AIRPLANE FORCE TO TAKE PART IN MIMIC WARFARE

Cities of the Middle West Will be "Attacked" by Airplanes in Mimic Raids During May

WASHINGTON, May 6 (UP)—Airmen, workers in the Fifth Corps Area with the cities of Dayton, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Springfield, St. Louis, Kansas City, Columbus, and Wheeling, Cleveland and Akron, subject to capture or air raids by land and flying forces has been declared effective May 15.

From May 15 to May 21 more than 200 army air Corps planes divided between the Red and Blue fleets will work out tactical problems and attempt to raid various cities. From May 21 until the maneuvers end on May 26, emphasis will be placed on ground operations. The big show is scheduled for the area over Cincinnati. At 10 p. m. they'll "interdict" the air attack there from which the city will be defended by pursuit planes. The "battle" will be broadcast by radio.

As a by-product of the maneuvers, the non-stop refueling experiment of the army plane "Question Mark" will be put to practical purpose in an attempt to make a non-stop air raid on New York from Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio. The two-engine bomber will leave the Wright field at noon May 21, take fuel in the air at Middleburg, Pa., and fly to New York where two flares each representing a 100-pound bomb will be dropped near the Battery. 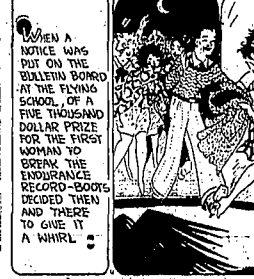

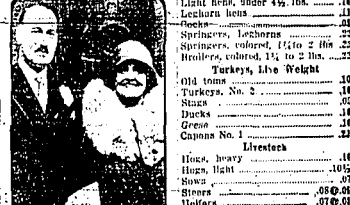
