POISON SCHEME SUSPECTED IN DEATH OF MAN

Strychains Discovered in the Stomach of Carroll B. Rablen

INQUIRY BEGUN INTO WAR VETERAN'S DEATH

Authorities Believe Mrs. Ava Rablen Gave Husband the Fatal Poison

SONORA, Cal., May 9 (UP)—The startling disclosure that poison had been found in the lining of the stomach of Carroll B. Rablen, 34-year-old war veteran, today had firmly convinced Tuolumne county authorities that he was the victim of a plot hatched by his erstwhile bride of two years.

STRYCHNINE FOUND

Discovery of strychnine in the victim's body came after an earlier analysis and further tests showed evidence of the deadly drug. The analysis was made in an Oakland laboratory and the results were reported here en route to authorities.

The strychnine which authorities believe will further substantiate their belief that Mrs. Rablen administered the fatal dose to her husband during a dance in Tuolumne nearly two weeks ago was placed in the hands of Dr. E. O. Heinrich, Berkeley criminologist.

Widow Identified. Specimens of Mrs. Rablen's handwriting and the register of a Tuolumne drug store on which a "Mrs. Joe Williams" had signed for the purchase of the strychnine was forwarded to Dr. Heinrich. Two checks at the drug store have identified Mrs. Rablen as the "Mrs. Joe Williams."

She obtained frock worn also was forwarded to the Berkeley criminologist. The frock was spotted with coffee when Mrs. Rablen jumped into it as she carried the strychnine to her husband who sat outside the dance hall in an automobile.

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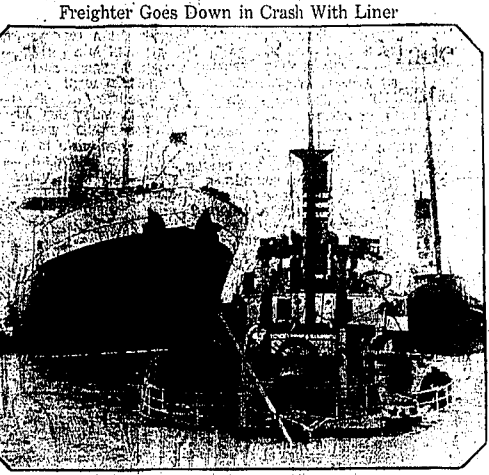

VIKING VESSEL TO VISIT U. S.

Roald Amundsen is Name of Boat That Will Go From Norway on Tour of a Year

OSLO, Norway, May 8 (UP)—A dozen or more countries including the United States will be visited by the Viking ship which will be sent out from Norway shortly for a year's tour, the chairman of the committee promoting the voyage told the United Press today.

The vessel, which will be named Roald Amundsen, will sail partly as a memorial to the Norwegian explorer and partly to acquaint the rest of the world with Norwegian products.

Captain Folger will be master of the ship, which will be an exact reproduction of a medieval Viking ship and carry Viking costumes which the crew will wear when entering ports.

Beginning here, the Roald Amundsen will sail down the Norwegian coast to Sweden and Denmark, and thence will make ports in the Netherlands, Belgium, England, France, Portugal, Spain, North Africa, Brazil and Argentina.

From Argentina it will sail down the coast around Cape Horn, believed the first attempt of a Viking ship to make such a voyage.

The Roald Amundsen next will sail up the west coast of South America to San Francisco, where the voyage will end. Native of the countries visited will be invited aboard the ship to inspect the exhibitions of Norwegian goods.
