BOISE CAPTURES FIRST PLACE IN CALDWELL MEET

Burley Takes Second Place in Inter-district Track Meet; Brains Capture Six Points

CALDWELL, May 13.—Springing down the elder paths in an early lead and carrying on to the final events, the young warriors of the Boise track team rose to victory over 22 other high schools in the inter-district track and field meet at the College of Idaho stadium here Saturday afternoon, treating their nearest opponents from Burley by nine points.

Boise aggregated an even to score. Burley's count was 31 and Caldwell, through the performance of her lone star, Roy Brown, trailed a fourth with 10. Pifer followed with 10. The rest of the teams were lunched under the 10 point mark.

Boise's score would have been still and should have been still larger, for the relay team sprinted in at least 10 yards in advance of the Burley runners, only to find, however, that the Braves had been disqualified because of a 3 runner. Forster had crossed the boundaries on the exchange of the baton. The disqualification wipes out the relay four from the state meet and costs the team almost a sure five points.

Burley star winner, Ferguson, a well built youth, was DuPuy's salvation. He skipped to a first in the high hurdles in 37 seconds, came within 5 of an inch of equalling the state record in the high jump, placed second in the pole vault, filled in the broad jump and shared for point. Simpson—the Burley relay star—tried to amble with highest individual honors with a total of 16 1/2 points.

Wills Smith, the distinctive Boise veteran, was second for high honors by finishing third with 14. In both the 100 yard dash and placing second in the 200 yard dash. Caldwell took second in the quarter and broad jump.

Although no state records were broken, several performances were equalled the Idaho marks and the records in all events were better than any hope for them.

EMPLOYMENT—PAYROLLS

BY ALLARD-SMITH

Vice President, The Union Trust Co., Cleveland, O.

AMERICAN wage earners were employed in larger numbers during the first months of 1936 than at any time in two years. Their pay envelopes were the fattest since early in 1932.

These facts are revealed by the government's monthly survey of factory employment and payroll conditions. The index of employment for March was 86.6 compared with the base figure of 100 as the average for 1926. A gain of 6 per cent over the corresponding month one year ago is shown.

Payrolls made an even more impressive increase, resulting in greater general purchasing power for commodities.

Of the 12 great groups of industries the greatest showed gains over March one year before. The heaviest increases were reported for iron and steel, automobile, structural iron work, non-ferrous metals, agricultural implements and electrical machinery.

Employment in the lumber industry was unchanged from one year ago, while there were small declines for the textile, leather, stone, clay, glass and tobacco trades.

It is notable that factory production in the first quarter of 1932 surpassed all previous records in many important lines, employment was approximately that of 1926. It is in direct proof of heightened efficiency and the spread of labor saving machinery. However, practically no unemployment was reported this spring from great industrial centers. Labor replaced by machinery has been readily absorbed by many new lines and services which have sprung up in recent years with the advent of the automobile, radio and other modern activities.
