## FRESH RIOTING BREAKS OUT IN TEXTILE TOWN

National Guardsmen Arrest 200 Picketing Strikers in Tennessee

## SEVERAL INJURED IN ELIZABETHTON RIOTS

Arrested Men Placed in Busses and Carried to Jail; Relief Fanned

ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., May 14 (UP)—Rioting broke out here today in this section of textile town, with national guardsmen arresting more than 200 picketing strikers who were armed with bayonets, gas can bombs, and tear mace.

Relief Star Voted

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., May 14 (UP)—Having voted \$100,000 for the relief of striking workers at the American Cyanamid and American Bemberg rayon plants at Elizabethton, the fund to be collected at the rate of \$1000 per contribution from each national union chapter, the Tennessee federation of labor organizations moved today to complete its routing business and clear the way for its transfer to the hands of the strike committee.

Parades Planned

Then parades and mass meetings were planned to bolster the workers' morale and to show the apparent operations of the plants with non-striking workers. The demonstrators also will be escorted by the National Guard.

Major George L. Berry, president of the International Printing Pressmen's union, who instigated the proposed relief fund, charged today that the American Cyanamid company of Johnston City, near Elizabethton, locked out workers there and sent an additional national guard troop into the town to guard the plant.

"An 'imported' German, auto mechanic, who is working at the plant, was called upon by Berry to appeal for support of their cause in Washington, D. C., where the German printing pressmen are on strike.

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## Death Takes King of Walkers at Age of 90

NEW YORK, May 14 (UP)—Edward Payson Weston, walker of magnificent distance, rode to death in his last goal today.

The "King of Walkers" passed his 90th milestone, a mark he had equaled only once before, when he came yesterday found him unable to use the legs that had carried him in triumph in more than 100 athletic tests.

Weston had scored any other mode of leaving his legs. As a spy and dispatch bearer during the Civil war he learned to rely on his own locomotion when the enemy shot his horses from under him.

The fact started Weston on a professional walking career. In 1857 he passed the 1250 miles from New York to San Francisco, 385 miles in 101 days and seven hours, fighting blizzards for 20 days on the way. The next year he walked from Santa Monica, Calif., to New York, 3500 miles in 76 days and 12 hours.

When he was 56 several intruders attacked him at his farm home near Westport, N. Y., and tried to steal his horse, but he shot in the leg.

After that, walking wasn't so easy. The mental attitude of the man was changed as his physical process diminished.

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## DEATH CLAIMS WELL-KNOWN FUEL MAGNATE

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 14 (UP)—Frank S. Calk, prominent western fuel magnate, died in his apartment in a hotel late yesterday, death resulted from an attack of influenza, it was said, which he had been suffering since last January.

Calk had been prominently connected with the development of the coal industry since coming to Utah from Pennsylvania in the early eighties. He was recognized as one of the great fuel magnates from 1921 to 1925. He then became president of the Liberty Fuel company, holding this position until the time of his death.

NO DATE SET FOR ATLANTIC JOURNEY

Big Dirigible Was All Ready for Thrilling Oceanic Trip Wednesday

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 14 (UP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible Graf Zeppelin, announced today that the start of the zeppelin on its second westward voyage across the Atlantic, scheduled for tomorrow morning, had been postponed.

The flight was postponed indefinitely for two reasons, namely, unfavorable weather over the English channel and the fact that the dirigible is to take the northern route and possibly because of a lack of fuel.

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## Wickersham Will Be Chairman of New Commission

WASHINGTON, May 14 (UP)—George W. Wickersham, who in a recent speech said such legislation as the Jones "fire and gun" law was too harsh, will become chairman of a new commission to study law enforcement commission. It has been learned authoritatively.

Wickersham, internationally known as a lawyer, attorney general in the Taft cabinet, and a former secretary of the American Bar Association, consented recently to become a member of the commission but asked further time to consider the president's request to be chairman.

Wickersham will have charge of an investigation covering prohibition as well as all forms of law enforcement and violation.

Wickersham is 70 years old, and a native of Pittsburgh, Pa.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 14 (UP)—Two men were held in jail on an open charge after an automobile accident today when a car struck a bridge on the Saltair Speedway.

The car, a Buick, was driven by one of the men, who was killed, and two others seriously injured.

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## JURY TURNS IN MURDER VERDICT AGAINST UTAHIAN

Blacks' Gibson Convicted of Slaying James Papacostas in Pool Hall Row at Helper

HELPER, Utah, May 14 (UP)—"It was a 10 cent game," remarked John Martin, alias "Blackie" Gibson after a jury found him guilty last night of the murder of James Papacostas at Helper pool hall, Nov. 25, 1922.

"It was the thirteenth of the month. There were thirteen juries and the judge wrote twenty six instructions, which was thirty three."

Papacostas was shot to death on November 25, 1922, after an altercation with "Blackie" Gibson in a Helper pool room over a dance hall girl. The slayer escaped on May 30, 1923, after a flight of 11 months.

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Her husband insisted upon her being a "bunchy" even to the extent of locking the door and trying to tie her down with a sheet when she wanted to go to her sister's birthday party.

# LUMBER TRADE IN NORTHWEST GROWS BETTER

### Timber Magnate Issues Most Hopeful Statement in Six Years Regarding Industry

PORTLAND, Ore., May 11 (AP)—The Pacific Northwest, through its timber is more prosperous by approximately \$50,000,000 than it was a year ago, and if lumbermen will be reasonable in production, a similar increase probably will be noted in the next year, it was declared here by C. S. Keith, president of the Oregon-American Lumber company and one of the largest lumber operators in the United States.

The timber magnate's statement is the most optimistic given out here for at least six years. It was in 1923 that timber stocks in this vicinity started to pile up, and it took five years, or until last April for holders to start liquidating.

There are a number of causes for the greatly improved tone in the lumber trade, Keith explained. Foremost is that the supplies of the retailers have become exhausted, due to liquidation of the last year, so that the general consumer is virtually dependent on production for his needs. Another is that the southern pine supply is near the exhaustion point.

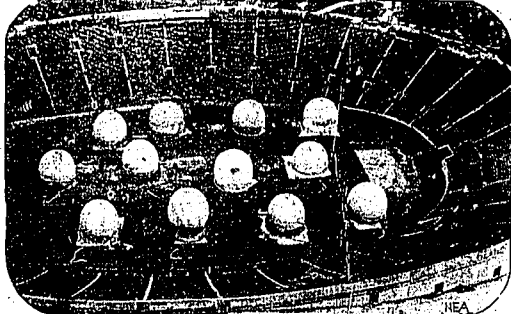
# Former Rancher of Paul Buys 80 Acres

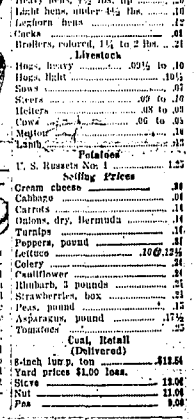

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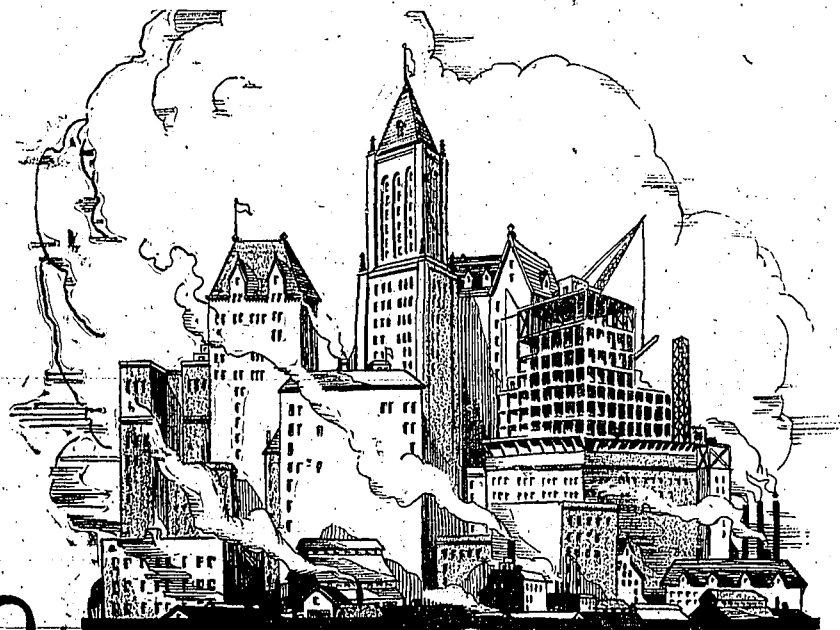

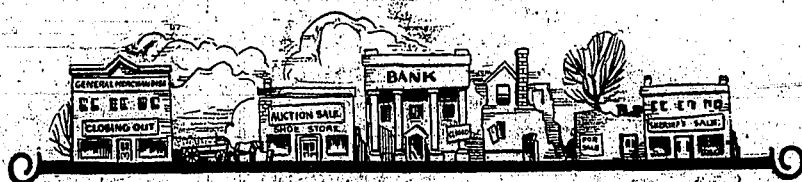
