#### BOTH MACHINES OATH FIRE AFTER ACCIDENT

#### Charred Body Found at Scene of Wreckage, Other Man Jumps to Safety

COLUMBUS, O., May 8 (UP)—Unable to free his parachute which became entangled by the tangled coils of his disabled plane, Lieut. Lee Meadows of Los Angeles was killed and Lieut. J. S. Soller jumped to safety when their airplanes collided in midair north of here today.

Both planes burst into flames. Meadows burst into flames as he fell from his cockpit. The cord of his parachute which was tangled around the undercarriage of the falling ship, was dead, his body fully charred, when nearby residents reached the wreckage.

Soller's ship, disabled by the impact, struck off in a northerly direction and landed in a field. The motor exploded as he jumped and the aircraft was a mass of tangled wires and twisted metal.

Soller's parachute became entangled in a tree, but he was unhurt. Meadows' plane fell between Soller's and the garage at the Veneta Downey home.

The wreckage of the plane, a 1928 Curtiss biplane, was found in a 55th percent squadron from Holt Field, Los Angeles, and was being repaired at the army air-ground managers over central and southern Ohio.
