BOISE CAPTURES TITULAR HONORS IN STATE MEET

Track Championship Goes to Braves; Burley Wins Second Place; Filer in Fourth Place

BOISE, May 21 (Special)—With athletes from every section of Idaho entered the team of Hobbs High school won the state track championship in the meet held here Saturday afternoon. Burley won second honors, scoring 19 points, compared with Boise's 23. Filer took fourth place with 10 points. Two state records were broken. 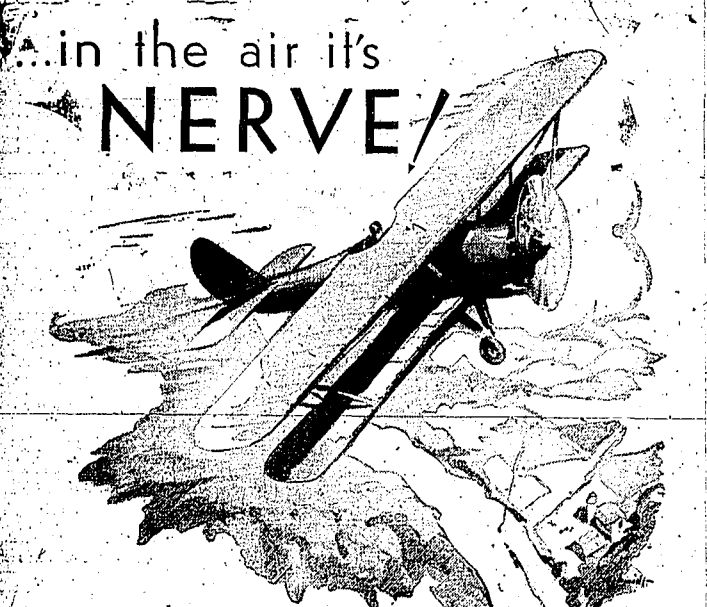

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purchased and brought into use by individuals and associations of breeders. Some concrete idea of the scope of this work is afforded by the fact that in one breed, Holsteins, an importation of 10 of the best bred sires obtainable in the Northwest was made recently in the Burley district. Other dairy breed boosters are also at work adding to the quality of their strains through purchase of new individuals.

There are other lines of endeavor on the farm that occasionally yield bigger returns than the dairy business, but over a period of years few ventures will return to farms and farmers profits that vary less. The industry is stable as to income, and in recent years has always yielded a profit that could be depended on. Because of that stability, and because it adds also to the value of farm land and, provides an anchor when other branches of farm activity may not fare so well, dairying has rightfully been established as one of the most desirable activities of the farm.

The development work that is being done in the two counties in interbreeding dairying as a major farm activity reflects credit on the big district and adds to the wealth and stability of the state.

WIDESPREAD BENEFITS

ONE of the chief arguments in favor of authorizing construction of the combination gymnasium and auditorium for our public school system is that the benefits to accrue will be so widespread in application.

The combined enrollment of the two high schools, junior and senior, is slightly in excess of 1500, we are informed. During this school year the advantages of physical education were enjoyed by in excess of 700 boys and girls in the two schools. Physical education classes, do-not leagues' basketball games and training of varsity teams for both boys and girls in basketball accounted for this wide use of the present sadly-inadequate gymnasium facilities.

If voters authorize the bond issue of \$20,000 at the special election June 7 so the present court between the two school buildings can be inclosed the scope of physical education work is to be expanded, according to plans of the school administration. Special gymnasium work will be available for the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades as well as by high school pupils. That means that far more than half of the pupils of our school enrollment will have facilities for physical education.

At present Twin Falls has two golf organizations. The country club organization has been in course of organization during the past few weeks. Our information is that approximately \$10,000 of private funds have been invested in the property of this one club. It must be borne in mind that the expenditure is being made with private money, but on the other hand the membership is a limited one. Probably direct benefits of the club and the golfing it makes possible will not apply to more than 150 or 200 adults. The move, even though so comparatively few persons will benefit by the club's activities, is heartily commendable.

If we can afford to invest \$10,000 of private funds for the benefit of a comparatively small group of adults, can we afford NOT TO INVEST \$20,000 in improving facilities for the physical education of the eight upper grades of our public school system?

We dwell all too fully on the subject of lack of funds, yet we are able to buy cars, tractors, radios, electrical equipment and many other products and commodities that add to the joy and success of living. We have admitted other neighboring school districts to take a well lead on us in facilities for indoor physical education and indoor athletics. Can we consistently continue on such a course?

If the big Twin Falls spirit that used to make this community a by-word for progress and initiative all over the Northwest has not died during the past few years we will have our improvement.

DAIRYING GOES FORWARD

THE dairy exposition that was held at Burley Thursday serves to focus attention of this part of the state on the rapid progress that is being made in Cassia and Minidoka counties in developing the big industry that has the dairy cow as its foundation.

The whole community, or rather, a group of communities that are the centers of that big irrigated country, have displayed a lively interest in dairy farming for some time, and the interest has resulted in appreciable growth of the number and size of herds.

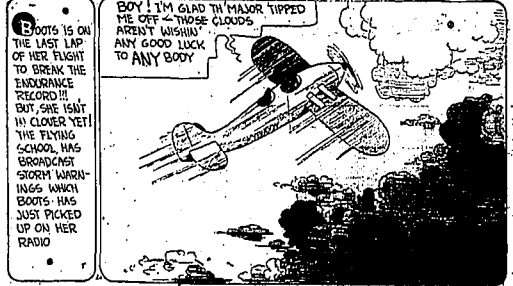

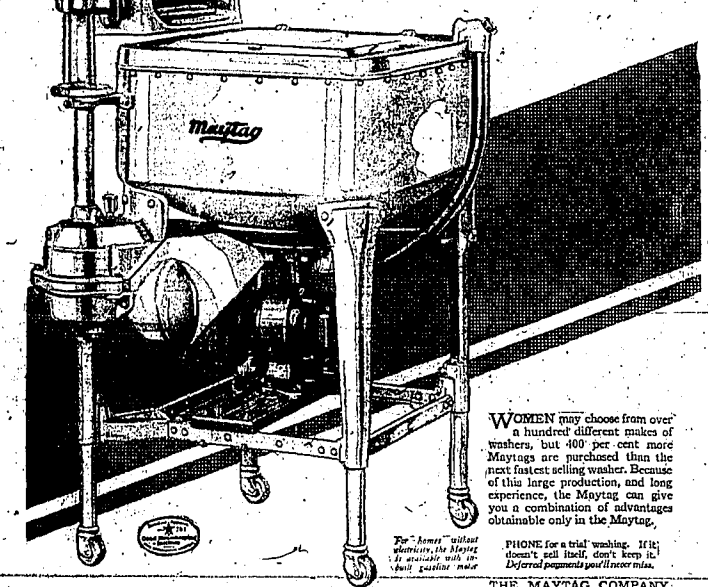
