CUBS AND CARDS ARE PRIMED FOR CRUCIAL SERIES

Chicago Goes to Stronghold of Cubs With a Lead of Only Half a Game in Race

NEW YORK, May 22 (UP)—The pace-makers in the National League—Chicago and St. Louis—enjoyed well-earned rest today before leaping at each other's throats tomorrow at St. Louis in the first "crucial" series of 1929.

Holding a bare half game advantage over the Cardinals, the Cubs have had three scheduled games which may have small part in the making of National League champion.

True, it is a little early for "crucial" but, as John J. McGraw once remarked, a game is a game, April or September, and there is more than a little chance that every one of the 22 games played between the Cubs and Cards may have a direct bearing on the 1929 pennant chase.

Should the Cubs sweep the series they will establish a lead of 3 1/2 games—a half game of the margin that separated them from the pennant winning Cardinals last season.

Should the Cards do the same they will hold a 2 1/2 game advantage which, while hardly convincing this early in the race, is still large enough to be important.

Chances are small, however, that either team will make a clean sweep of the three scheduled games. They appear, but not evenly-matched for that. In the three games they have played to date the Cubs have won two, while Joe McCarthy's troopers gained decisions in the other two.

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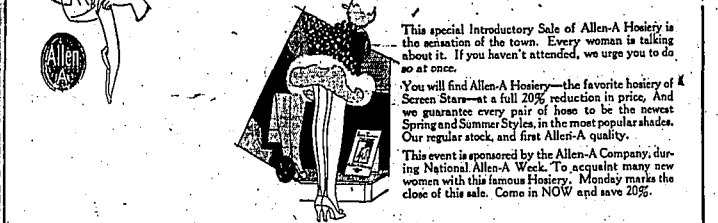

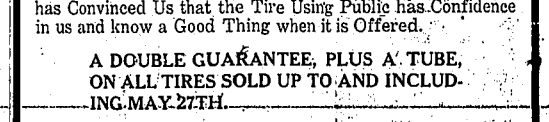

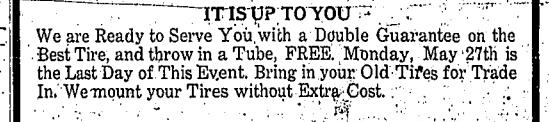

IMPORTANCE OF GOOD LIGHTS

THE importance of adequate lighting in industrial establishments is emphasized in a recent address by Miss Eleanor P. Brown, secretary of the national society for the prevention of blindness.

"Improper lighting is one of the most important factors, responsible for industrial accidents," she said. "Not only could the number of such accidents be materially reduced, but thousands of cases of seriously defective vision among working men and women could be avoided by remedying faulty illumination in industry."

Miss Brown pointed out that approximately 15,000 of the 100,000 blind people in the United States lost their sight because of eye hazards in mines, factories and shops, and asserts that nearly all of these accidents could have been prevented.
