HAGEN-JONES GOLF RIVALRY REVIVED AGAIN

Golfers Disagree As To Whether Bobby or Walter Is The Greatest All Round Expert.

The recent victory of Walter Hagen in the British open championship in which he outgolfed the field for the second successive year, has reopened the old argument among golfers as to whether "The Hawk" is a greater all-around player than Bobby Jones of Atlanta.

Adherents of the American amateur champion bring vociferously to arms in his defense. "Not No!" They point to Bobby's record—to the titles he has won, the low medal scores he has turned in, and call your attention to the fact that Jones has a far better average for championships won in the United States than the more successful Hagen.

Walter's admirers, on the other hand, are lauding his four victories in the past eight British open championships and are pointing with pride to the fighting qualities which he displays in coming back after apparently being out of the picture.

Certainly Hagen is the better fighter of the two. It does not believe he is the greater golfer. If a test could be devised whereby both players were to play under the opportunity to prepare separately for a match of, say, 100 holes, with the player who led during the week of an open championship, and such a match were played under the best conditions, you would find the two close together at the finish.

In a shorter test, at which I should take Hagen for my money. But in the longer match, Jones' consistency would tell.

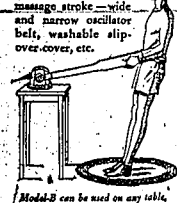

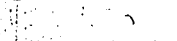

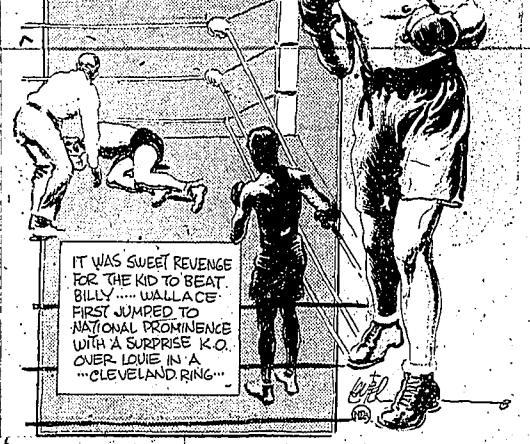

 for \$1,621.65; C. W. Haystack and others asks for \$23,514.43 and interest. Hargis asks for \$3,000.22. Since the allegations are almost identical in each case the trial of one will serve as a barometer to test the strength of the other actions.

The complaints allege that the Salmon River Canal company failed to make a levy to irrigate and maintain a sufficient water service to the farmers who are irrigated by the canal. In each case, the levied charge was paid, it is claimed. There was sufficient water in the reservoir July 1 to properly water the crops when planted, it is stated, but the canal company is said to have furnished this water in an irregular and wasteful manner, making it impossible for the growers to get the best results from the crops. They were therefore applied to a certain extent. The plaintiffs ask damages on the resultant loss, based on what they would have made had the water been supplied and their bean crops permitted to reach full development.

The action Friday morning will be tried before Judge H. H. A. Baker at the request of Judge W. A. Haddock, who states that his conclusions with the tract might possibly make him unequalled to sit on the case.
