WASHINGTON, May 23 (UP)—The way was cleared today for passage by the House of the new tariff bill on May 28 when Chairman Snell of the rules committee introduced a program for disposition of the measure.

The Snell rule provides the House will consider only committee amendments and that no other suggested changes to the measure will be permitted from individuals, even when a rate is opened by a committee revision.

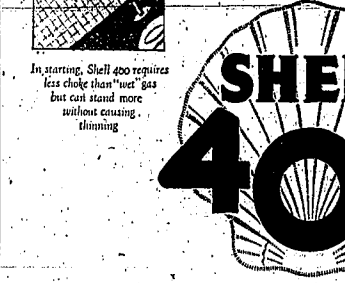

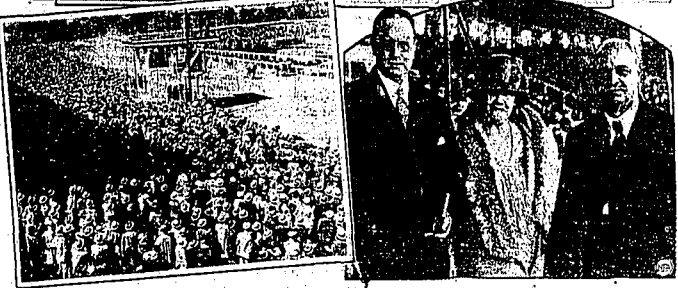

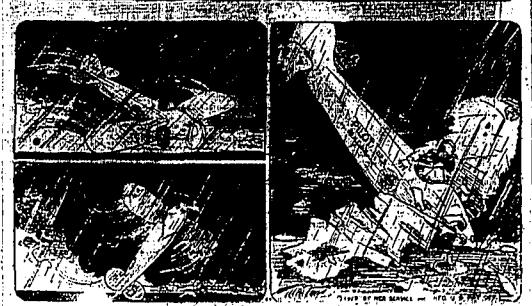

They are bent upon solving the mystery of the motor that failed over France.  
The air liner arrived at 5:10 p. m. today as it had departed just eight days before, flying quickly and gracefully, the engines humming smoothly, the landing was made only by Dr. Eugen Kokenor, commander of the ship, directing the flight from Toulon, France, where the dirigible was forced to land by June 10, and the engines broke down was speedy and uneventful. The Graf Zeppelin left Toulon at 8:15 p. m. yesterday, making the voyage of approximately 400 miles in a little over 24 hours.  
The passengers, including Mrs. Mary Tice of New York, who was among the passengers leaving Philadelphia on the attempted flight to America, boarded the ship at 7:45 p. m., and shortly afterward the ship was on its way to the homeland over France.  
The Zeppelin's last act when he left Toulon was to thank the French government for the courtesy and assistance it had given to the dirigible during its days of distress.
