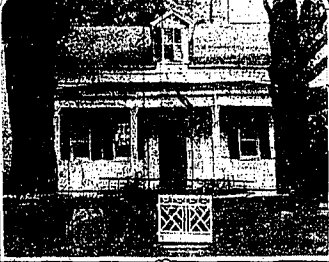
FINAL WEEK IS BUSY AT SCHOOL

PORT WORTH, Tex., May 25 (UP)—A bright sun beamed down on Mission Field today, bringing added cheer to the eight-heroes of the Robbins and Jim Kelly, youthful airplane pilots who are striving to establish a new sustained flight record, and destined to end in success. The two have almost completed their sixth day in captivity.

Both felt yesterday and last night, adding to the pressure to the difficulties of the flight, but before midnight as the tires passed they tried hour by the all-time success.

The monstrous roar of the 24-horsepower motor of the Ryan monoplane was drowned in the cry of the two men nearly all day. They went about at least a mile a day and if their circling continues they will pass the 144th hour at 12:30 a. m. today.

Plant Specialist To Visit Here in Coming Week

Survey of alfalfa fields in southern Idaho reported to be suffering from bacteria wilt disease, the being made by Dr. C. W. Hufferd, assistant dean of the college of agriculture at the University of Idaho and plant pathologist at the University experiment station.

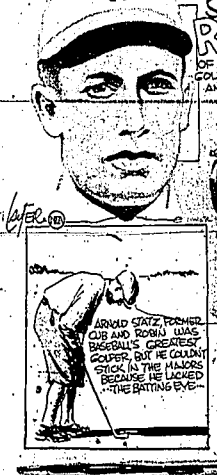
