THREE WESTERN CLUBS FIGHTING FOR LEAGUE LEAD

National Race Proves to Be a Battle Between Cubs, Cards, and Pirates; Giants Coming

NEW YORK, May 28.—With three western clubs fighting for lead in one of the most stirring early season battles in history, the New York Giants are steadily climbing back in the race. Amidst the crest of a five game winning streak, the Giants face the first crucial test of Saturday. Dazzy Vance and Bill Watter are slated to oppose each other.

This week and week two between the Cubs and Cardinals has been turned into a three cornered affair by Pittsburgh. Taking three straight from the Cards the Pirates have moved into second place, a game behind the Cubs. Half a game behind the Pirates are the Cards.

Through their ability to beat Washington, the Philadelphia Athletics have attained a three and a half game lead over the St. Louis Browns in the American league. Eleven of the Athletics' 23 victories have been won at the expense of the Senators.

Both races are running true in recent creditable play and look National league affair and a run-away American league race.




