**GERMANY TO PAY?**

The problem of reparations has been settled, we are informed.

Germany will be required to pay \$488,000,000 annually for 59 years, or a total of 28 billion dollars, including interest at five percent. The allied powers will receive 28 billion dollars from Germany as war damages.

But did the allies win the war, just because, more than 10 years after the declaring of the armistice, an agreement has been reached that Germany is to pay a certain specified amount each year as damages? They did not. Germany and her allies lost the war, and so in all the greater aspects did England and France and Italy and the United States and the rest of their allies. Nobody won the war.

We lost some 10 million men on the allied side alone. What the economists have to say as to the loss in property, resources, trade etc. in addition to the loss in human lives, we are not now informed, but we do recall that the war debt of the United States alone, including the debts owed us by our allies was in excess of 25 billion dollars. So it ought not to be necessary to go any further to make up our minds as to war as a source of profit. The facts, as we are becoming increasingly well aware every day, are that war is a source of waste and loss so stupendous as to exceed our powers of conception. War losses are simply too big for us to grasp their extent.

We derived some incidental benefits from war.—Surgery went forward. We learned some new things about explosives and also made great strides in airplane construction and operation. There were other things in which we learned some constructive lessons. But over and against these small gains what terrific losses we had to stand! We learned how to hate, and hatred has left marks on the mind of civilization that may possibly cost us more than the amount of Germany's reparations payments.

The American Legion has sponsored a movement in this country to conscript wealth on the same basis as manpower in time of war. The bill providing for wealth conscription now before congress should be adopted and enacted into law. If there is another war let it be a war by conscript boys and conscript dollars—not by conscript boys alone.

We talk a lot about the failure of discussion and negotiations to avert war and go to war but it is noticeable that killing men does not decide much. War is organized killing that precedes negotiations carried on by so-called statesmen who are supposed to be in a position to negotiate much better if they can do their arguing and debating after a few million men have been killed and civilization has been fettered in the balance.

Germany to pay? What' grizzly humor! The world pays, innocent and guilty alike. We call ourselves highly civilized, but in some respects we are more barbarous than the lowest aborigines because we use our intelligence and the machines it has brought us in warfare. Civilized 1929! What ghastly jokes we really are!

**AIRPORT IS ASSURED**

TWIN FALLS is to have an airport. The contract for the work necessary to be done has been let, and the field will be ready for use within a few days.

We have a right to feel some real gratification over the assurance that we are to have an airport. The field will be large enough to serve planes of all kinds and descriptions and so will provide us with facilities that will enable us to have our share of business by air. We are definitely on the map in this respect. And the field has been procured at very slight cost. Other communities are heavily bonded for fields that will serve their purpose in no more effective manner than ours which stands us an expense of less than \$2,000.

**DISREGARDING SAFETY**

The department of commerce requires all men who would get licenses as commercial airplane pilots to take extremely strict medical examinations. The doctors who give these tests, it seems, have to be constantly on their guard. Scores of men, who know they are not physically qualified, try to hoodwink them and get-passing marks that they do not deserve. Few, if any, succeed; yet the doctors have to be exceedingly vigilant.

This represents a rather queer quirk in human nature. The strict physical examination is as much a safeguard for the pilot himself as for anyone else. If a man isn't properly equipped, physically, he can't fly in safety. Yet many men disregard this and try to become pilots anyhow. They seem to overlook the fact that by doing so they are simply jeopardizing their own lives.

**GERMANY'S MERCHANT FLEET REVIVES**

The World War practically wiped out the German merchant marine fleet, once one of the greatest in the world. After the armistice, merchant ships flying the German flag were scarce.

Now, however, the German merchant fleet is four-fifths as large as it was in its palmy pre-war days. It had in 1914 a tonnage of 5,200,000; now it has more than 4,000,000, and is growing fast.

Only the British and American merchant fleets surpass it in size; and a writer in the current World's Work predicts that Germany's fleet will pass America's in the next few years and press hard on the heels of Britain.

This fact is a high testimonial to German industry and efficiency.

**MRS. WILLEBRANDT'S SERVICES.**

It has been known to a friend of Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt for several months that her husband had retired from the public service to which she has given so much ability and earnestness, and to take up the practice of law. For this reason she was anxious as to the position she would hold under the Hoover administration. She had looked upon with some of her resignation, and hesitates by no means readily to be surprised. President Hoover has steadily characterized her official work as "conduct with distinguished success," and points out that it could not have been performed "by one of less legal ability and moral courage."

Sincerely and effectively to prosecute the enforcement of the prohibition law during the months prior to a presidential campaign in which it would necessarily be a major factor, resisted the highest degree of moral courage. To defend that law and to support during the progress of such a campaign an opponent to challenge the most able and intelligent of social forces. Mrs. Willebrandt has done this. Officially she has been recognized, not merely by the great mass of American people, who have by her official acts during the campaign, as its most valiant defender, but in more dignified fashion by the force of the law as the personal target of a maliciously aimed and directed, beyond a doubt the general conviction among the electorate that Herbert Hoover stood for an honest endeavor to enforce the prohibition law and much to do with his sweeping success at the polls. Nobody did more to create this impression, to arouse this conviction, than did Mrs. Willebrandt. Her official work during the campaign has been followed by her official work during the campaign, and still she believes that prohibition can be enforced where salutatory observance fails, and that the approval of her attitude by their support of the presidential candidate whose cause she espoused.

It is one of the misfortunes of public service that it pays better in money than in honor. The quiet, self-sacrificing woman, Mabel Walker Willebrandt, who well fitted herself from the one and an increased supply of the other. She may not have shown her official duties with the knowledge that she stands for a cause as the foremost woman who has thus far contributed to the cause of the national government, and that she retired from the service with the respect and gratitude of the great mass of the American people.


