AMERICAN HORSE WINS IN ENGLAND

Reigh Count Takes Mile and a Half Race for Coronation Cup; Runs Beautiful Race

TRIP DOWN: England, June 4 (AP)—Reigh Count, American thoroughbred, retained himself today when he won the mile and a half coronation cup race over the turf course at Epsom tracks. The race was worth nearly \$100,000 and a \$100,000 cup to Mrs. John D. Herby, prizewinner of the 1923 Kentucky Derby winner, who has been beaten in the three previous starts in which he has won. Reigh Count, owned by Sir Barnes Ashford, will be sent to Tring, yesterday's winner of the derby, to second, Sir St. Smead's Plancher, third. Smead started in the mile and a half event.

Reigh Count, who hitherto had been unable to find himself on the left-hand grass tracks at Epsom, was held a mile and a half by Ashford was the favorite at 3 to 4, while Plancher was 5 to 1.

Reigh Count ran like a green horse. The finish was a battle between him and the Irish colt. Herby and Count got the decision by a show over and Plancher was a length further back.
