Northern Idaho Forest Man Describes His Exciting Experience With Raging Timber Blazes Of About Two Decades Ago

Editor's Note: Ranger Pulaski and his men fought themselves completely surrounded by raging flames from which there seemed no escape. Tongues of fire were licking at the vitals of the forest. The red men were every where. And then, but read his amazing story for yourself.

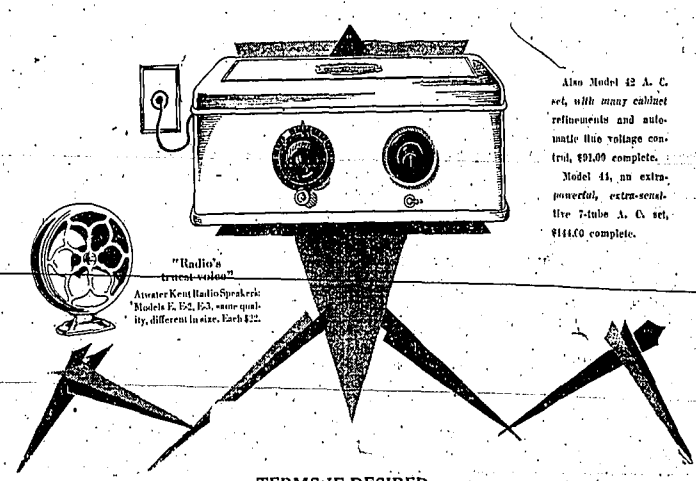

It is not only physical sickness with which we have to deal. More hospital beds in the United States are occupied by mental cases than by all other sick combined.

We have observed with great interest that a memorial is being planned by the late Dr. Thomas William Salmon, who was distinguished in the field of mental hygiene. As part of the campaign it is being pointed out how prevalent the mental diseases really are. Every clinic and hospital treat the diseases of the brain and nervous system are crowded with sufferers.

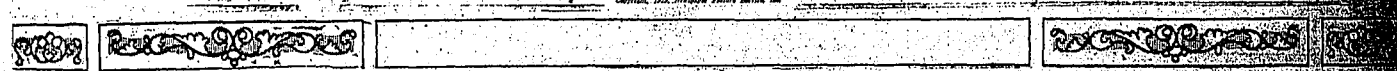

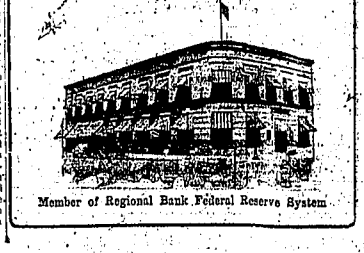

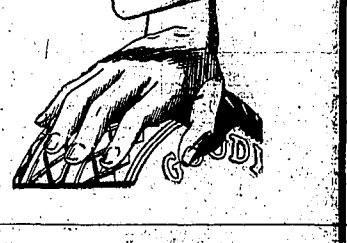
