

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Photoelectric Cell Makes Talking Pictures Possible

Talking Pictures Possible

An electric bulb, only slightly larger than an ordinary electric light, is the element which makes possible the reproduction of sound directly from a moving picture film. The comparison between the electric light and the photo-electric cell as it is technically called, can go no further. For the photo-electric cell is the direct opposite in every other way.

The ordinary electric lamp is fed with current and in exchange gives off light. The photo-electric cell, developed by Bell Telephone Laboratories for use in Western Electric sound picture equipment, feeds light and in turn causes variations in an electric current whose strength which bear a direct ratio to the amount of light which enters the lens. The percentage intensity of this light to vary in proportion to the amplitude of a sound wave, the current from the cell becomes an electric replica of the sound.

The actual sound record is visible on the film in the form of bars of varying density and spacing which appear as a narrow strip beside the pictures and pass through the electric lamp and the photo-electric cell. The strip is of uniform darkness, a uniform amount of light passes through the film and consequently there is no sound. But as this sound record strip allows light from the lamp to pass through it in varying intensities and enter the transparent aperture in the photo-electric cell, electric currents of varying strength and frequency are generated. To bring these most minute impulses up to sufficient strength for reproduction, they pass through amplifiers which magnify them several times. From the amplifiers the current passes through control panels and thence to the loud speakers which speak it in a manner perfectly synchronized with the picture it accompanies.

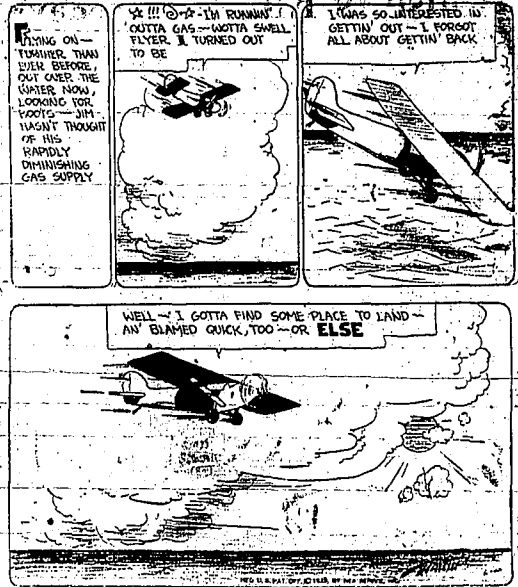
