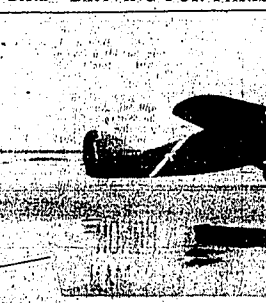



CHANGE IS MADE

ANOTHER incident showing the trend toward the popularity of afternoon newspapers as compared with morning papers is furnished in the change made by the Nampa Free Press which on Monday of this week began issuing in the afternoon. It has been a morning paper for several years. Some of the reasons for the change are included in the following excerpts from the Free Press editorial announcement:

"Today the Idaho Free Press comes out as an afternoon instead of a morning paper. It is a change long contemplated by us. In our modern day and with present day equipment for handling telegraphic news the chief happenings of the world can be received, printed and distributed to many of our patrons the same day the news originates. This is a decided advantage to our patrons who otherwise would be compelled to wait until the day after to learn the chief items of world interest. Nor acquire mail customers inconvenienced in any way. They receive their paper on the same mail, as if the paper had been printed during the night and distributed in the morning.

"As our readers are aware, the current day is some seven or more hours older in the chief European centers than with us. And eastern United States is likewise some two hours ahead of our time. By 3 o'clock in the afternoon we are therefore enabled to get the European world news up to nearly 10 p. m. of the same day. In like manner what becomes available before 5 p. m. Eastern standard time, gets into our afternoon edition of the same day. The happenings of the afternoon and the most of the major current events for the day are over and have become history the day before we go to press. This enables us to furnish you the news the same day it happens.

"Had we remained a morning paper, it could not have been so. We could have received the same telegraphic news, but instead of its getting into your hands this evening it would not reach you until tomorrow morning. Our changing from a morning to an evening paper enables you to get your news practically one day ahead of the time any morning paper can furnish it to you. If news is news only while it is new, the Free Press will enable you to get the newest news."

"For one newspaper to change from morning to afternoon publication may mean little or nothing, but when the general trend toward afternoon newspapers is understood, the shift takes on real significance. The total afternoon newspaper circulation in the United States and Canada for 1928, according to estimates made by the American Newspaper Annual and Directory, was 27,125,000 as against 6,300,000 for morning dailies, a ratio of more than 4 to 1 for afternoon papers.

Best Editorial of the Day

THE FARM RELIEF BILL

The measure designed to give agricultural relief is now a part of the law. We have it after a long and arduous struggle. It is a relief bill and the next thing to be decided is how we are to do it now to do it. The first thing to be done, it would seem, would be to have as clear as possible an understanding of the law and then the best possible cooperation to see that the law is made effective and beneficial.

There may be a few of those who believe that the measure of the farm relief bill will make agriculture a bed of roses and that all of the troubles which have beset that occupation will disappear, but fortunately those who think and feel that way are few.

The farm relief bill is a great measure. Enacted after years of effort and struggle, it is an expertly worded and understood measure and those best in a position to understand believe that the measure can be made very effective and do what it is hoped for.

At least an act of congress cannot be introduced in the economic life of the nation. The new plan is frankly experimental and doubtless imperfect. But there is reason to believe that it will open the way to important improvements in the condition of farm life in the United States.

Under existing conditions the scheme may be found necessary; there will be opportunity to make those when their need is demonstrated.

Meanwhile the law should be accepted in good faith. There should be no undue expectation. Farming has its chance to advance, as the Republican platform said, "in a least of economic equality with the rest of the country."

It is up to all the farm interests to give the measure hearty support, such support may make the difference between success and failure.

Writers' Cramp Common Symptom of Muscular Rebellion

PAIN SPASMS OFTEN DUE TO OCCUPATION

"Muscular Neurosis" Is the Medical Term for This Trouble, Differing from Neuritis and Caused by Monotonous Efforts Required in Daily Tasks.

THESE muscles of ours have a habit of rebelling against continued stress made of them. They are patients, but if the demands are too great they will speak out in protest.

In the medical books we read about "occupational neuroses," what in the world are these?
They are the spasms or localized pains which follow stress of the muscles. One example is the condition called "writer's cramp."

Telegraph operators, piano players, dress-makers, typists are liable to these symptoms. In any occupation where long contractions and efforts of the muscles are required in the work one of these ailments may appear, and it is not liable to be cured.

"Nervous people," "nervous people"—what we call "nervous" persons are more likely to suffer from these attacks.

The onset of writer's cramp is marked by dull aches or tired feeling in the wrist and hands, the muscles of the arm and wrist.

There will probably be a contraction of the hand and fingers, and the symptoms are made very much worse by attempting to write.

This trouble is slow in coming. One example is the tenderness on pressure. The nerves are not at all sensitive. But, as I have said, every effort to use the muscles in their ordinary occupation will bring on the trouble.

A. M. D. Q.—What causes a tired hand?
A.—This is probably due to auto-intoxication. Avoid constipation and exercise daily in the open air.

R. H. Q.—Are raw eggs good for the stomach?
A.—No.

A.—Should I eat a hot dinner?
A.—No.

J. O. B. Q.—Down eating sugar improves the condition of the blood and makes the skin shine?
A.—Yes.

A. A. Q.—What should a boy of 17 eat a lunch full weight?
A.—He should weigh about 140 pounds.

A. YOUNG HEADLID. Q.—I am a young man, 21 years of age, and I have a lump in the side, about the size of a walnut, which is visible to see in swimming?
A.—You should weigh about 118 pounds.

A.—You would like to have your doctor advise you under these circumstances?
A.—Yes.

M. S. Q.—I am 14 years old, 5 feet 4 inches tall, what should I eat?
A.—What do you advise for pimples?
A.—You should weigh about 120 pounds.

C.—Correct the diet, by cutting down on sugar, starches and coffee.
R. P. Q.—What causes urticaria and what treatment is advisable?
A.—Urticaria or hives may be due to constipation, or some food which produces an irritation, or a nerve disturbance or to a possible kidney condition. The diet and urticaria are important factors in most cases.

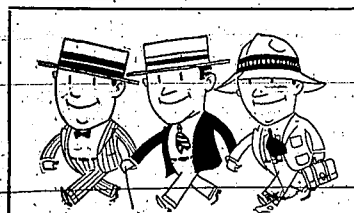
