JONES DEFENDS ENFORCEMENT OF LIQUOR LAW

Prohibition Not Responsible for Border Shootings Declares Senator... OFFICERS DEALING WITH A ROUGH GROUP OF MEN Believes Groups Agents Are in the Right Until Found in the Wrong

WASHINGTON, June 23 (UP) - The character of bootleggers and not prohibition is largely responsible for the recent series of killings by border agents, Senator Wesley E. Jones of Washington declared in an interview today.

Author of the "Five and Ten" law-five years in jail and \$10,000 for liquor law violations - Jones is regarded as the dry dog in Congress.

"The prohibition people are opposed to a fair trial," Jones said. "I would like to see the government agents shot without prosecution or without a good reason. They are doing it to get their hands clean."

It may be true that prohibition is a bad thing, but it is not the cause of the border shootings. The cause is the bootleggers who are attempting to violate the law, which causes the shootings.

REPORTS CONFLICT REGARDING MACHINE

Scraplines and Four Destroyers Engage in Thorough Search Today

REPAIRS CONTINUED

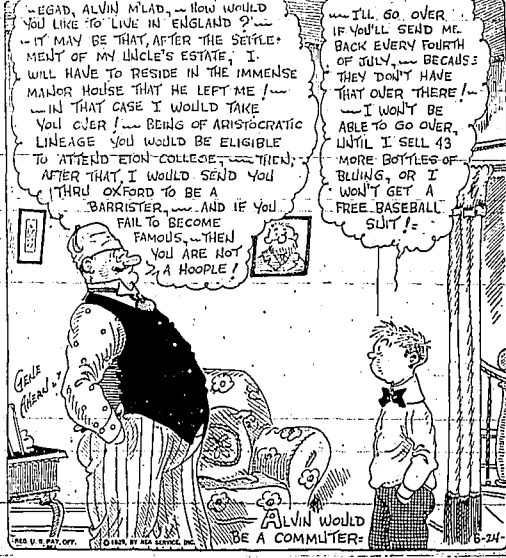



But, through all the years, it had one great virtue. It worked. The great British navy, with squadrons sailing in all parts of the world, made possible the mighty development of the British empire.

Now, after more than three centuries, this tradition is being abandoned. The mere fact that a British prime minister was willing to sit down with the ambassador from a foreign power and discuss naval reduction shows that the old policy of maintaining naval superiority at all costs has been abandoned.

What the new one may be will depend on the wisdom and foresight of the statesmen of England and America. If they are selfish and blind it can result in a tragic failure. But if they are big enough, it can bring a tremendous amount of good.

The tradition of war is a strong one. But if the old British naval tradition can be given up, the whole war tradition is in peril.
