Five Countries Join in Search for Spanish Destroyers

French Government Orders Destroyers to Look for Aviators

Aerial Resources of Spain Are Mobilized

Italy, Portugal, England and France Lead Work in Rescuing Work

Madrid, June 25 (UP)—Five European governments joined today in the abortive search for the missing Spanish aviators.

In addition to the naval and aerial resources of Spain which have been mobilized for the hunt, Great Britain, Italy and Portugal have sent out fast destroyers to search the waters of the Atlantic between the coast of Portugal and the Azores, where the fliers were believed to have been trapped in their huge Dornier seaplane while on an attempt to fly to the United States.

Ships Receive Orders Today the French government addressed two of its destroyers, the Leonard and the Joffre, to join in the search. It was announced here that the French navy minister has ordered those ships to leave here for the coast of Spain this afternoon.

It is believed that the Spanish government continued to cling to the slender hope that the aviators were still alive. The three flight companions on the "Lindbergh" No. 16, would be the first to be rescued.

Search of ships and seaplanes continued the area in which they were believed to have crashed. Wireless stations, as well as the private receiving stations, stood by in the hope of picking up a message which might lead to the recovery of the plane and the rescue of the four men.

Every possible means was made use of by the government in making the search for the aviators. In spite of the slight hopelessness of the task, still refused to believe that the men were dead.

## WINNER OF FIGHT TO MEET SKARKEY OR JACK DEMPSEY

Future of Schmeling and Uedund at Stake in Bout at Yankee Stadium Thursday.

NEW YORK, June 25 (UP)—What will happen when Max Baer's victory right fist connects with Pauline Piccolini's iron chin at Yankee Stadium tomorrow night? The question grips the attention of boxing fans throughout the world today.

Reaching the highest level of interest manifested in any boxing contest since the second Dempsey-Tunney bout at Chicago in 1927, tomorrow night is expected to draw a crowd of more than 60,000 and gate receipts in excess of \$500,000.

Unless the bout turns out to be a rude disappointment, the winner should figure prominently in the selection of Gene Tunney's successor. Present plans call for the winner to meet Jack Sharkey in September, or perhaps Jack Dempsey if the former champion elects to fight again.

FIRST CUTTING HAY IN SHOCK

"Almost the entire first cutting of hay is now in the shock and plans are progressing for the immediate stacking, a drive through the country between Twin Falls and Castleford Monday revealed. There is still some cutting of clover hay being done, but this is mostly in the shock. The crop in general gives evidence of a good yield, but the weather is stilling sticky and the warm weather of the week is making the stubble more difficult to cut. Development for a good second cutting is in the west. The wheat of the country to the west is in excellent condition. Practically all fields show the grain heading out. The cold weather in the past week caused most of the crops to stand out and head up well, so that the yield, though a few days late, will be one worth counting. Beans and beets are all up and the sugar beets have a good start, thinking being all done. There is a greater acreage of beets this year than anything else and the fields are all well cultivated and well handled.

**FARM LAMBS ARE GOOD ON MARKET**

Idaho shipped 25 cars of pound farm lambs during the last week in May, states a report just received by the college of agriculture of the University of Idaho. Of this total, 17 cars went to the Chicago, 12 to St. Joseph and one to Chicago, 12 to 20 double deck loads of the 25, compiled by association in the counties of Ada, Canyon, Cassia, Blaine, Lemhi, Blaine, Blaine and Twin Falls last week, consisted in the counties, show that 18 of the 20 Chinese government at Shanghai.

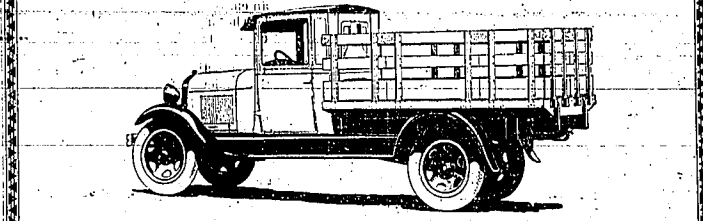

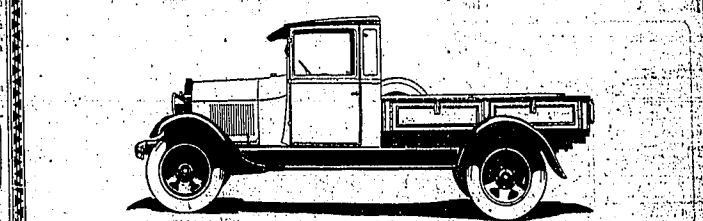

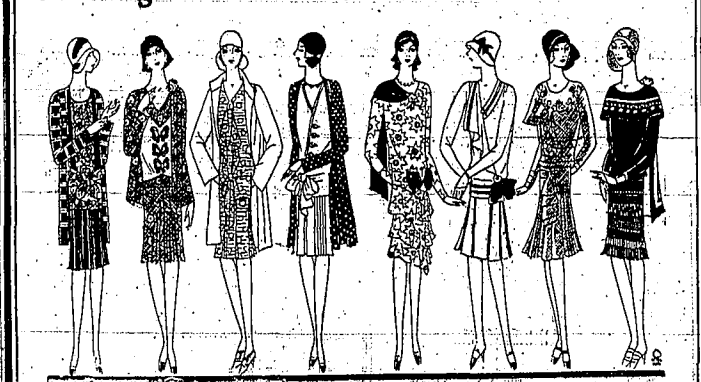
