



FORTY THOUSAND EXPECTED TO SEE TONIGHT'S FIGHT

Eyes of Boxing World Trained Upon Schmeling-Uncudin Battle in Yankee Stadium

NEW YORK, June 27 (UPI)—The path to the heavyweight championship begins at Yankee Stadium tonight.

A PEST BRINGS RICHES
THE lowly rabbit, which used to be the chief pest of farmers in New Zealand and Australia, is now providing those people with a good deal of prosperity.

When rabbits were first introduced into the lands down under, they nearly ate the farmers out of house and home. So rapidly did they multiply that crops were devastated. Farmers used to organize great drives to round them up and exterminate them.

Then someone discovered that America was a marvelous market for felt hats. And rabbit skins are used in the making of felt. So, now, according to Major W. H. Cochrane, assistant secretary of the Bush Terminal in Brooklyn, many shiploads of rabbit skins reach New York annually from New Zealand and Australia, to make hats for the American head.

The result, of course, is that the same farmers who used to curse the rabbit are now making money off of him, and the ships that bring the pelts to this country are taking back autos, radios, plumbing equipment and other adjuncts of prosperity.

OUR NATIONAL MEAT
IF ENGLAND'S great staple of diet is supposed to be roast beef, the national meal of the United States seems to be pork.

At any rate the American people eat more pork than any other meat. Figures compiled in the Outline of Business, issued by the Central National bank of Cleveland, show that more than one-half of all the meat eaten in the United States is pork, with beef ranking second and veal, lamb and mutton trailing in the rear.

Incidentally, we are eating more meat now than ever before. In 1919 the per capita consumption of meat in this country was 130 pounds; now it has gone up to 138, and it's still rising.

GETTING RESULTS

SOMETIMES tunnels are driven in a search of precious metals, but the Twin Falls Canal company tunnel under South Park from just east of the bridge on the south side of Rock creek was driven to release imprisoned drainage water. Two big "strikes" have been made to date, one that yielded about four second feet of water, and the other, opened by a shot Tuesday, that released about six second feet. 
