OUTLAWS RAVAGE REGION OF CHINA; SITUATION GRAVE

Leaders Seek to Prevent Disbandment of 300,000 Soldiers

JAILS ARE TORN DOWN; PRISONERS LIBERATED

General Feng Considers Going into Retirement; Must Retire or Fight

SHANGHAI, June 27 (UP)—A sudden uprising of outlaw soldiers in Hopeh province where towns were plundered and killed were destroyed, further complicated the government's problems today while leaders sought to prevent the disbandment of 300,000 soldiers under General Feng Yuhsiang and Governor Yen Hsi-shan of Shansi.

You has threatened to leave his province and live abroad if the government insists on his taking over Feng's troops. He reportedly insists on retiring from the political field. Withdrawal of the two leaders would leave a vast army practically uncontrolled.

Government troops were today raising from leaders in western Hopeh province, reported under communist leaders captured several towns including Changyang and Lichuan. The army, since the prisoners freed. One massacre was reported at Lichuan. A small number of soldiers in the district has repudiated the outlaws but two battalion commanders have been killed and reinforcements are needed.

Many of Feng's units are in families areas and all of them are accustomed to accepting discipline only from the highest local authority.

Feng must fight or retire since a state of war exists between him and the national government. He prefers to retire but the government as yet has found no leader who is willing to assume the responsibility for his troops.

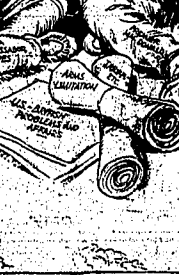

WAR SWANSON PROVES A STAR ON CINGY TEAM

Youngster Showing Wealth of Speed: Was All Around Athlete - In His College Days

By FRANK GETTY (Union Press Sports Editor) A breakthrough in athletics when Tim Cobb ran wild on the base paths is young Earl Swanson of the Red Sox.

In this day and age, when any old "teen wagon" can get a steady job in a company, it is hard to find a man who can hit for average and score runs during the season, the dash and speed of the Red Sox is refreshing.

Young Swanson can't hit much more than his own weight, as yet, but he can step around those base paths. Recently he scored from first on a home run which was a real stunner and a real-time home.

Jack Hendricks, manager of the Cincinnati club, which acquired Earl from Vernon in the Pacific Coast league, believes that the boy will pick up his hitting after a little experience.

An All Around Athlete. Swanson went to Lombard College at Champaign, Ill., where he was a freeman rule. He won 13 varsity letters, playing on the baseball team, playing basketball and end at football, winning all the dash events at track and playing all over the court at basketball.

A PEST BRINGS RICHES

THE lowly rabbit, which used to be the chief pest of farmers in New Zealand and Australia, is now providing those people with a good deal of prosperity.

When rabbits were first introduced into the lands down under, they nearly ate the farmers out of house and home. So rapidly did they multiply that crops were devastated. Farmers used to organize great drives to round them up and exterminate them.

Then someone discovered that America was a marvelous market for felt hats. And rabbit skins are used in the making of felt. So, now, according to Major W. H. Cochrane, assistant secretary of the Bush Terminal in Brooklyn, New York annually from New Zealand and Australia, to make hats for the American head.

The result, of course, is that the same farmers who used to curse the rabbit skin now making money off of him, and the ships that bring the pelts to this country are taking back autos, radios, plumbing equipment and other adjuncts of prosperity.

OUR NATIONAL MEAT

IF ENGLAND'S great staple of diet is supposed to be roast beef, the national meat of the United States seems to be pork.

At any rate the American people eat more pork than any other meat. Figures compiled in the Outline of Business, issued by the Central National bank of Cleveland, show that more than one-half of all the meat eaten in the United States is pork, with beef ranking second and veal, lamb and mutton trailing in the rear.

Incidentally, we are eating more meat now than ever before. In 1919 the per capita consumption of meat in this country was 130 pounds; now it has gone up to 138, and it's still rising.

GETTING RESULTS

SOMETIMES tunnels are driven in search of precious metals, but the Twin Falls Canal company tunnel under South Park from just east of the bridge on the south side of Rock creek was driven to release imprisoned drainage water. Two big "strikes" have been made to date, one that yielded about four second feet of water, and the other, opened by a shot Tuesday, that placed about six second feet. The tunnel is being pushed further back to see if other "strikes" may be made. Everyone who gives any thought to the matter will agree that it is better to keep seep water out of the soil, but when drainage work has to be done it is heartening to get results such as have attended the driving of this tunnel.

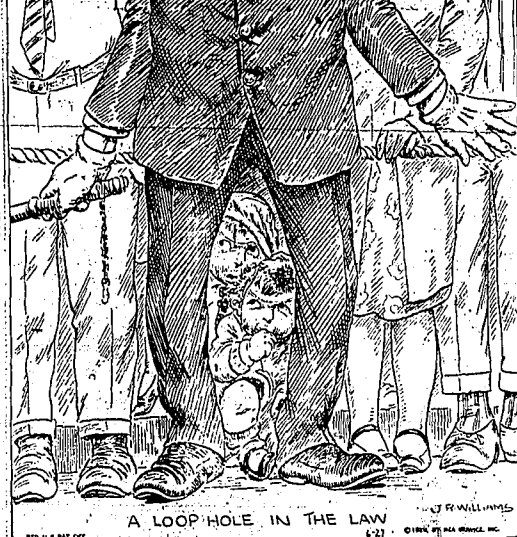

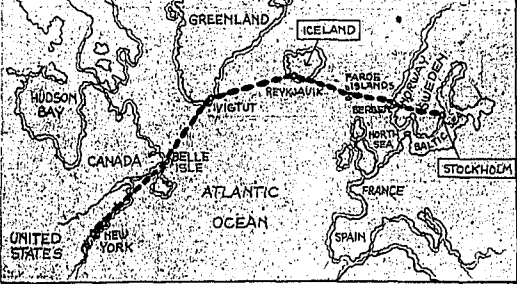

MICHIGAN EDITOR PAYS TRIBUTE TO IDAHO'S WONDERS

BOISE, June 27.—(Special)—Michigan is a much older, wealthier and probably considers itself a more superior state than Idaho, but evidently there is one editorial writer in that state who feels that Michigan can learn from Idaho. The following editorial from a prominent Detroit daily tells why:

"Few people think of a potato well exploited resource. But some agencies interested in boosting the interests of the western part of our country, are sending out little booklets entitled, 'The Possibilities of the Idaho Potato.' The spirit of adventure, which animates the people in making the way about the world, seems to be the dominating principle in this peculiar romance.

"Idaho has demonstrated that in a good state, but its geographical position and topographical contour would hardly recommend it as a strong competitor with the other food-producing districts of the country. It has a large, lively soil population; is pretty well watered by mountain and has a long way to go to the big markets.

"Nevertheless, the agriculturalists of that state have refused to be satisfied. They know, when they grow more bushels per acre on the average than any other wheat growing area, Idaho orchards last year sold their apples in 44 states and in some foreign countries, and got returns amounting to about six and a half million dollars. Idaho farmers need beans into the markets of 22 states, many of them among the foremost bean-raising areas of the world.

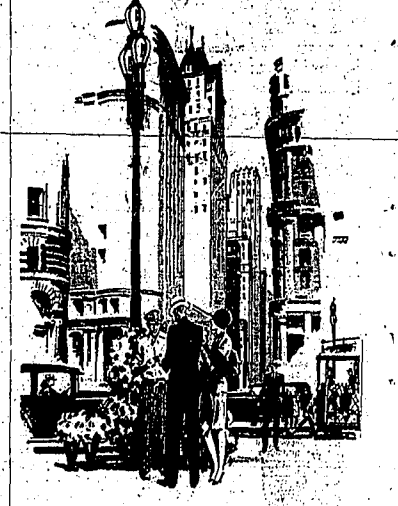
