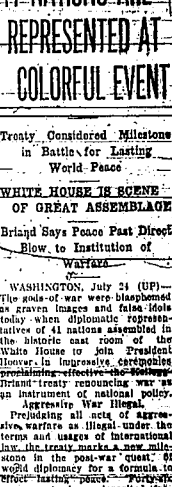

CUBS RETURN TO HOME CITY FOR 17 GAME STAND

Chicago Team Jubilant and Believe Next Few Games Will Place Them in Lead

CHICAGO, July 24 (AP)—Off to a successful start on a 17 game home stay, which they believe will take them out of front in the national league race, the Chicago Cubs were in their most jubilant mood of the year today.

Stated at coming home, from a long season they only had one half game behind the league lead. The Pirates of the Cubs pulled out that "we've got the smoothest functioning machine we've had all season" they were confident.

The team started the home stay unexpectantly yesterday with a 2-0 victory over the New York Giants. The affair was a pitcher's battle between Charles Hoot and Carl Hubbell, each pitcher allowing only four hits. Hoot won when he kept the Giants' hit men scattered.

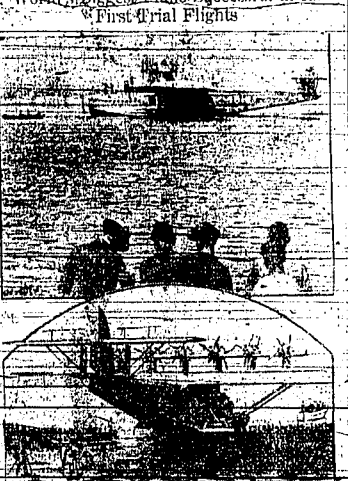

CO-OPERATION NEEDED
 ANOTHER development during the past few days in the railroad situation furnishes a reason why the Boise Valley districts should lend their aid to the district south of the Snake river in the Twin Falls country to bring about an extension of the Minidoka-Buhl branch to the main line of the Union Pacific.

We refer to the opposition against the Nyssa-Winimucca cutoff to which the Union Pacific is reported to be a party. The Boise valley has been seeking that cutoff as a means of securing a direct route into Northern California where a big bulk of its products are sold. The ambition is logical enough because under present conditions the Boise valley products have the long haul by way of Pocatello and Orem and thence in to California, or the northern route to Portland and thence south. Either route is circuitous.

A great part of the benefits the Boise valley is seeking for movement of its products into California could be realized if the Minidoka-Buhl branch were extended across the Snake to hook up with the main line somewhere west of Bliss. The Boise valley would then have a back haul to Twin Falls from where the cutoff to Wells could be utilized to shoot its freight directly into California markets.

The Twin Falls country is interested in a main line extension because its haul to the west coast would thereby be shortened. At present when off products go west to Portland, or other coast points, an additional haul of about 120 miles has to be made. The freight has to go east to Minidoka and thence west again on the main line.

Extension of our branch line to tap the main line of the Union Pacific would not only have the result of furnishing the Boise valley with the cutoff to California it desires but would also give the district south of the Snake river in the Twin Falls country a needed quicker service to the west coast. Mutual benefits can be secured through the practice of some co-operation.
